To my knowledge there have been sold upwards of 10,000-000 pounds of copper, the greater por-tion of which was disposed of last week. The sales in question avera made as The sales in question were made a low as 12½ cents net, cash equivalen to about 12% cents delivered in 30 days These transactions were about equally divided between foreign and domestic orders. The sales effected last week were at prices somewhat better than those I have quoted and some business has been done at 12% @12% cents for electro. My information is that both the brass and wire industries have re-ceived some encouraging orders which accounts for the most part for the bet-ter business booked by the copper sell-ers."
