LOCAL BRIEFS.

Bathing Excellent.—The bathing at Saltair is reported to be excellent, and the number of bathers is increasing from day to day.

Disturbed Girls' Rest.—The Rowland Hall girls who sleep out in the porches of the school building, had a hot night, were disturbed last night, by boys throwing lighted crackers onto the porches. The police were called, but the young delinquents were gone when the officers arrived.

BRUTAL GREEN ASSAULTS GIRL

Fee Phillips, Thirteen Years Old,
Tells Awful Story of
Affair.

POLICE SET A TRAP FOR HIM

And Succeeded in Arresting Him After
A Long Chase—Gives the Name
Of James Hallison.

A brutal and dastardly assault was made upon Fee Phillips, the 13-year-old daughter of L. A. Phillips of 26 Emerit court, last Sunday evening. Jim Hallison, a Greek, was arrested last evening and locked up in the city jail charged with the crime. The Phillips girl has positively identified the fellow as the man who assaulted her. The arrest of Hallison was brought about by the incessant work of Officer George Phillips, uncle to the girl.

The assault occurred about 10 o'clock on Sunday evening. The Phillips girl and a companion were on their way home from a party at the O. S. L. viaduct. Miss Phillips' companion stopped to talk to a couple of friends and Fee continued over the viaduct, walking slowly. She had gone about fifty yards when a man seized her by the arm and then placed his hand over her mouth to prevent an outcry. The brute carried the girl to a vacant lot near the Fair grounds, and she declared, fastened her to the ground with stakes. She says she was kept there until 4 o'clock in the morning. The man cut some of her hair and the girl discovered that he had a razor and a revolver. She noticed that he had a cut in the back of his hat.

TOLD HER TERRIBLE STORY.

When it began to get light, the fellow hastened away. The girl managed to free herself and ran to her home. She told her mother the story. Mr. Phillips at once reported the matter to Officer Phillips, and they began working day and night to apprehend the offender.

Last evening the officer set a trap for Hallison. The girl was told to walk over the viaduct again. She did so, and Hallison seized her as before, but when he saw the police coming, he ran and succeeded in making his escape for the time being. Later Officer Phillips located the man in a restaurant and placed him under arrest.

At the police station the girl positively identified him. He had a pair of scissors and a razor, but did not have a revolver. There was a cut in the back of his hat, as the girl had described.

PUT IN SUPPLY NOW.

Shipments of Coal Into Salt Lake Area Heavy at Present.

S. M. Barlow has returned from a business visit to the coal country in the south, where he was told that the shipments into Salt Lake are now 100 per cent in excess of what they were two years ago, and unless consumers load up now, there will be some very severe experiences the coming winter. New coal properties are being opened up in the future and the supply, but even with the increase of output there, and from the northern coal mines, there will not be enough to supply the demand. The Utah Gas & Coke company will have 50 tons of coke a day to put on the local market, which will help out a good deal, only people will have to learn how to handle coke effectively in their stoves and ranges. The draft must be increased, and the stoves and ranges watched rather closely. There has been nothing in the local coal market thus far to give any indication as to when an advance of 50 cents a ton might be expected.
