Jesse Rockefellow, alias Jesse Reese, has been arrested by Sheriff Joseph W. Balley on the charge of perjury. The arrest was made by the sheriff at The arrest was made by the sheriff at Glenns Ferry, Idaho, on the line of the Oregon Short Line. The complaint charging Rocketellow with the crime was sworn to in October, 1903. It is charged that the prisoner while testi-rying in the case of the state of Utah against Lorenzo Rocketellow, who was found guilty of rape, testified to statements that he knew were abso-lately untrue, thereby perjuring him-self. The announcement that commencing Friday L. F. Lorce will succeed W. B. Leeds as president of the Chicago, Rock Island system has caused considerable stir in railroad circles throughout the country. It is taken to mean that the Pennsylvania lines are going to give George J. Gould a run for his money from this time on. It is a well known fact that, the Gould system has been raiding Pennsylvania territory in a decidedly exasperating manner for some time past during the process of practically paralleling the last named lines.

In self defense, it is alleged, the Pennsylvania is going to get after Mr. Could with a long stick and incidental-ly give the Missouri Pacific a taste of its own medicine. While L. P. San Francisco, Dec. 30 .- Local rail-oad circles are now interested in the rumors of the consolidation of the Western Pacific and the Butte and Plumas railroads, both of which have for over a year past been surveying routes from Oroville along the Feather of the state. The basis of the trans-action, it is said, is a proposition for a transfer of the interests of the Butte and Plumas road along the Feather river to a point near Oroville, or a joint river to a point near Oroville, or a joint agreement whereby the Western Pa-cific can use about 60 miles of the roadway of the Butte and Plumas company in order to make connections with Chico, Marysville and other points on the proposed route of this company to San Francisco. to San Francisco.
