THE PEOA RAID.

PEOA, Summit County, Utah, May 10th, 1887.

Editor Deseret News:

I will give you the facts of the recent raid of deputy marshals at this place. James Welch and J. A. Marchant were taken to Park City and placed under bonds to await the action of the grand jury. J. A. Marchant being placed under \$1,500 and Mrs. Jane A. Marchant under \$250. Hyrum Bates, of Park City, and James Watson, of the same place, becoming sureties. The deputy returned on the 12th, taking George Wardell, placed him also under bonds of \$1,000, Joshua Cosy and Wm. Cosy becoming sureties. There was one witness in the case held in \$250, Mrs. Margaret Mills, B. A. Mills, of PEOA, and George C. Kilder becoming sureties. There have been no deputies here since that time. It was a man by the name of J. M. Conrad, from Park City, who acted as spotter, a man that has lived in PEOA district and got his support from the people here.

NEW ENTERPRISE.

\$150 Sale of Carp in Southern Utah.

Editor Deseret News:

About four years since "Uncle" Wm. D. Johnson commenced the culture of fish with eight very small carp, his ponds being artificial, and near by his residence. The small fishy tribe were carefully guarded and fed like so many chickens, and would, on the call of their master, come rushing through the water catching up the crumbs of bread or crackers thrown to them. Last year the ponds were drained off and the fishes counted to the number of many hundreds, the original eight having attained the astonishing size of 22 inches in length and 4 around the body. Brother Johnson's success excited a spirit of enterprise in some of his neighbors, there being some natural lakes and reservoirs in the vicinity of Kanab, and a few of our citizens have formed an association for the culture of carp and for the benefit of other individuals desiring to get a start in the business. Brother Johnson last week drained off his ponds again, but did not count his fish this time, for their name was "legion." He sold to the Kanab Carp Association \$65 worth, principally two year olds, and to other persons about \$80 worth. Among the latter were President E. D. Woolley, Jr., who will stock the reservoirs at Pipe Springs, Bishop R. S. Robinson, who has natural ponds, Heaton Bros., of Moccasin Springs, J. S. Emmett, of Cottonwood, E. Y. Baird and L. C. Mariger, of "The Three Lakes;" and the Carp Association will operate in the beautiful waters known as the "Big Lake." The average price was \$1 each for two year olds. No doubt our northern friends will think we must be fond of fish—well, we think we are, but cannot say how they will taste, not having tried them as yet. Brother Johnson could not be induced to kill one of his pets; and those who bought them considered they would taste too much of the "dollar."

I am happy to say good health prevails in our settlement; our prospects are fair for fruit in our gardens and good crops in the fields. Our water ditches are now in good running order and dams strong, the people having decided to flume about a mile of our town ditch, part of which is completed and more will be done soon. We must have a pile-driver in order to secure our field dam, which is about twenty feet deep and 150 feet long, constructed of timber, brush and rock. Would like to know the probable cost of a 900-pound hammer, with gearing, etc. Don't see any advertisement in the News of our Salt Lake foundries. More anon.

MONGOLIAN MOVEMENTS.

CHINESE MALCONTENTS—LOST MARINERS—FORMOSAN GOLD, ETC.

By the arrival of the steamer City of Rio de Janeiro, at San Francisco, we have dates from Hong Kong to April 10th, and from Yokohama to April 24th:

In China a German firm has secured a contract for laying a railway between Banca and Keelung, in Formosa.

Extensive gold fields are reported to have been discovered in the southwest part of Formosa.

A Frenchman is said to have obtained the contract to construct a railway from Taku to Tientsin, thence to Peking.

News has been brought to Canton by letter-carriers from the north of the province, that a serious uprising against the government has occurred at Xom Chau, in the Kiang Si, or Kong Sal, provinces.

Piratical junks have recommenced their depredations near Hongkong.

In JAPAN.—A Woman's Benevolent Society has been established at Osaka. The president, vice-president and trustees appointed are the wives of officers of the Osaka garrison.

A new hotel for the accommodation of foreigners, is now being built at Tokio.

The adoption of foreign costume by Japanese ladies has stimulated the establishment of works for the manufacture of textile fabrics of foreign styles. Two or three are already under way.

Two cases of illness resembling cholera were reported in the capital the 11th ult. One ended fatally.

The steamers Fair Penang and Benton collided in the straits off Batu Pahat, about 1 a.m., March 30th. The former escaped with slight injury. The latter sank in a few minutes. She had on board about 200 passengers, of whom 60 were picked up by vessels in the vicinity. The rest on board were all lost, including Captain Miles, Chief Engineer Cooper and a few white passengers, the remainder being natives.

PACIFIC COAST NOTES.

CULLED FROM LATEST WESTERN EXCHANGES.

A dispatch from Fairfield states that the steamer Modoc ran into the wharf at Collinsville in such a manner that a gentleman named Winstock, a book agent of San Francisco, was killed.

The San Jose, Cal., Mercury says Ed. Wilson killed a monster lion near the Gilroy Hot Springs a few days ago. It measured nine feet two inches from head to tail. This is no doubt the largest beast of the lion species ever killed in these parts.

Fish Commissioners Sherwood and Roulter have returned from their visit to the Shebley Hatchery, in Nevada County, Cal., and report having found it well located and fit, after little repairs, to do business satisfactorily. It was decided to hatch at least 300,000 young trout there this season.

A close inspection of all kinds of fruit trees, and especially of vineyards, about Los Angeles, Cal., shows every indication of an average yield for this fall's crop. The great bulk of oranges have been shipped, but few carloads remaining. Oranges have done remarkably well this year.

A dispatch dated Reno (Nev.), May 13th, says: In the asylum investigation to-day much damaging testimony was introduced by the prosecution and not to be shaken by the most rigid cross-examination by Dr. Bishop's numerous attorneys. Defendant's counsel made strenuous efforts to suppress a large amount of testimony on the grounds of having been formerly given before a legislative committee. The chairman ruled that the whole truth must come out. The horrible scenes concerning the battery treatment are vividly described by witnesses, showing the most inhuman management possible.
