HALVERSON CASE IS DISMISSED.

Judge Ritchie Decides District Attorney Cannot be Cited to District Court.

ONLY LEGISLATURE CAN ACT.

Attorney for Defense Showed That Halverson Had Done His Full Duty Under the Law.

Ogden, March 10.—Judge Ritchie of Salt Lake City came to Ogden yesterday afternoon to hear the accusation brought by Henry Wessler against District Attorney Halverson, but it took him only a short time to throw the entire case out of court and cause the papers to be stricken from the files.

Henry Wessler in an accusation prepared by Attorney Farnsworth, charged District Attorney Halverson with not having done his duty in filing information in the district court against Joe Kendall, C. M. Klesner, Mike Berlin and E. V. Daley within 30 days from the time the men were bound over to the district court.

Attorney J. N. Kimball appeared for Mr. Halverson and moved the court to strike the accusation from the files, on the grounds, first, that the accusation was insufficient; second, that the court had no jurisdiction in the case; third, that no state official can be proceeded against in a district court and cannot be removed from office excepting for high crimes and misdemeanors; and fourth, that the accusation must be removed by impeachment, which must be heard by the Legislature, which alone has the right to remove a state official by such a process of law. Mr. Kimball also showed clearly to the court from the statutes of 1901 and 1903 that the law governing the filing of informations by a district attorney against men charged with crimes, does not specify any definite time within which he must file the information in the district court, only specifying that he must see that the person so charged gets a speedy trial. Judge Kimball also stated to the court that even if the court had jurisdiction in the case, that Mr. Halverson had done his whole duty in the case as he had filed informations against each of the four men, that Kendall had been convicted and is serving a 15-year sentence in the penitentiary, C. W. Klesner is serving a 10-year sentence, Mike Berlin forfeited his bail; and E. V. Daley was released by the court on his own recognizance, the witness against him having fled from the state, thus showing that the charges against the district attorney were without foundation.

After Mr. Kimball had completed his argument, Attorney Farnsworth read numerous authorities on jurisdiction and argued that the accusation was properly brought and should be heard by the court.

Judge Ritchie held that he had no jurisdiction to hear a charge against a state official, which Mr. Halverson is, and therefore dismissed the case.

TESTAMENT SAVED HIS LEG.

Thrilling Escape of Charles Miller, The Alleged Burglar.

Ogden, March 10.—Charles Miller, the man who made such a daring dash for liberty Thursday morning, when Sheriff Sebring and Deputy Wilson, is once more securely confined behind bars at the county jail, and will not get another chance to get away, as in the future when he is taken out of the jail he will go handcuffed. Sheriff Sebring arrived in Ogden yesterday afternoon about 2 o'clock with the prisoner.

At the jail Miller told representatives of the press of his escape. He said that the warm sunshine and longing for liberty prompted him to make the dash. After leaving the jail he ran up to the Catholic church and secured himself in the basement, where he remained until dark, then went down into the railroad yards in the hope of getting a train out of town. It was while waiting for the freight to pull out that he met Officer McIntire, who fired the shot at him, which struck him in the right hip. After his scuffle with the officer he hid in the yard until dark, then started to walk out of Ogden. He proceeded along the Union Pacific track to Utah, where he boarded a freight train and rode to Morgan, where he was arrested.

Miller was the most surprised man in Ogden yesterday afternoon when Dr. Gordon examined him for the bullet and told him that he was not shot; that the bullet had only caused a slight abrasion of the skin and had bruised him. He had stated before the doctor came that his leg pained him and he could feel the bullet in his flesh, but to the astonishment of all who saw the doctor make the examination of the slight wound, the bullet had not entered the flesh, and Miller made the remark, "Well, he saved me a show," meaning the New Testament he had in his pocket. On examination of the Testament it was found that the bullet had struck the same a glancing blow, penetrating only the cover and a few leaves, stopping at Matthew, fifth chapter and fifth verse. Miller said he was mighty thankful the bullet did not go into his flesh. He will keep the Testament as a souvenir of his exciting experience. A charge of jail break will probably not be preferred against him by Sheriff Sebring, as the officers are confident he will be convicted of the charge of burglarizing L. Clark & Son's store, and will get a heavy sentence for that.

BOUNTIFUL

More Aneut the Recent Smallpox Quarantine Difficulty.

Bountiful, Davis Co., March 6.—An article in Saturday evening's "News," evidently written by the local health officer, Mr. Hardy, set forth some very untruthful assertions regarding smallpox cases in Bountiful. The article accuses the school board of District No. 1, also John A. Hall and Bishop Dan Muir of an open violation of the law and of having made an effort to spread the contagion.

The fact is simply this: Health Officer Hardy has stated that there is something about the quarantine law that he has not understood. After disposing of several recent cases, in none of which he has complied with the law strictly, he stated that he had established precedents that the people were very much prone to follow.

When he has raised the quarantine in some cases, he has not issued certificates at all and in all cases he has ignored the presence of a physician in the town and has permitted patients to go at large without an examination. Now, because of this neglect or incompetence, Mr. Hardy is attempting to shift the responsibility of this recent trouble upon others.

Mr. Hardy further charged that Mr. Muir in securing a permit from the health board of Salt Lake City to re-enter his son at the University of Utah had misstated conditions. Mr. Muir denies the charge in his work, as they show that the best public sentiment is against the machines.
