Boston, July 18.-The American Wool and Cotton Reporter will say tomorrow "There has been a little more looking around for wool, and consumers generally may be said to have manifested more interest in the market, which fact, combined with the decided firmness shown at the London sales, where the decline in prices recorded at the opening has been substantially recovered has tended to impart a more cheerful feeling in the wool market. There is as yet no material increase to be noted There the volume of business transacted however, which still remains of very small proportions. The sales of week in Boston amounted to 1.343,000 pounds domestic and 320,000 pounds foreign, making a total of 1.663,000 pounds, against a total of 1, 316,000 pounds for the previous week. The sales since January amount to 71,835,000 pounds, against 149,776,000 pounds for the corresponding time last year.

The department of the interior in Washington has given notice of an im-portant change in the standing regulations governing the issue of patents for mineral lands. The regulations in question are those based on section 2022 of the revised statutes of the United States. This section reads as

ollowsi "Section 2322-The locators of all mining locations heretofore made, or mining locations heretofore made, or which shall hereafter be made, on any mineral vein, iode or ledge situated on the public domain, their heirs and as-signs, where no adverse claims exist on the 10th day of May, 1872, so long as they comply with the laws of the United States and with State. Terri-torial and local regulations not in con-flict with the laws of the United States governing their possessory title, shall have the exclusive right of possession and enjoyment of all the surface in-
