Silk Meeting.—From the Enquirer we take the following account of the Utah State Silk Association meeting, held last Friday in Provo, Sister M. T. Smoot presiding:

"The treasurer's report showed a balance on hand of \$209.20. A letter, which had been sent to President John Taylor, accompanied with a silk handkerchief and his reply to the same, was read.

Sister Kimball presented samples of silk, cleansed and prepared for use, as she placed them in the hands of the association. Bishop Wm. Paxon read a letter from a gentleman in Nottinghamshire, England, addressed to Agent Graves, offering to purchase and bring from England, for the use of the association, certain frames used for the manufacture of fancy silks.

Sister Eliza L. Snow spoke on the utility of silk culture and the adaptability of the climate of Utah for successful producing of silk. An- nounced that the Territorial Sericulture Association had all manner of machinery for the manufacture of all the raw material that could be raised in the Territory for some time.

Daniel Graves gave some counsel and advice on feeding worms.

Sister M. T. Smoot pressed the question of purchasing the frames as offered and suggested by the gentleman from England; and on the motion the offer was accepted and the frames ordered to be purchased.

The amount of \$30, having been subscribed for this purchase by Sister Zina D. Young prior to the meeting, the balance was raised in the meeting by subscription, and the treasurer instructed to forward the means to England for the frames.

Pleasant Meeting.—A very pleasant reunion of the family and relatives of the late President Brigham Young was held yesterday in the Lion House parlors. Among those in attendance were President Joseph Young, who presided, and Bishop Lorenzo D. Young, brothers of the departed. The meeting was appropriately held in the anniversary of his birth. After it had adjourned, the children went in a body to the family cemetery and decorated the graves of their father's grave. One of the subjects considered at the meeting was the obtaining of family genealogical data, for use in the Temple, a work entrusted by President Young during his lifetime to his brother Joseph, the eldest of the family. Between 30 and 40 persons were present, and a number of others in St. George telegraphed their sentiments to those in session here.
