AN AERONAUT'S PERIL.

FRIGHTFUL EXPERIENCE OF A
MAN BALLOONIST IN A RE-
CENT TRIP.

The German aerostat Wolff re-
cently had a most terrible experi-
ence during one of his balloon trips
the greatest of the art of war. In company
with Peter Schmidt and a number
of his friends he started in the balloon "Swallow" at 1
o'clock in the morning. The balloon
rose one mile and started upward
into the thick of a storm. Wind, fearful of the strong wind
and half around him, desired to make a landing as soon as possible.
He was unable to do so, however,
and was under a heavy load of
weight. The balloon descended
with violent rapidity. It finally
reversed a little clearing in a tem-
pestual mass. The balloonist responded
to the call. The balloon fell
more slowly and the people who
had observed a hurried fugitive underneath
to help him, found him to be dead.
I desire a little further explanation
of the accident. Wolff had a
balloon about him, and when suddenly a whirlwind
struck in. A terrible jerk sent me
on my back in the car. I jumped up
to find all things were turning
around. He then turned the car
upright. I called the names of
my friends who tried to assist me in landing.
Too late! His strength
was gone, legs, and I hear still
more rapidly and gradually lost
hold of his body on the ground.
My heart sickens, but I only
have my friend Schmidt, who still
lives in the earth's side. Almost
the clouds are sinking below us. We
are now in a whirlwind. I try to make something to hold
me up, but he sinks far down from
the edge that I can hardly grasp
his wrists, and he is weak to
make an effort for himself. However,
he is great, for when Schmidt
had a little set me back in the
back of his coat, and endeavor to
hold fast with the strength. A
few moments drag by in hopeless
despair, and finally succeed in
making a quick landing. I am
upside down again. In circles and
tumult, hat, stockings and clothes
swirl over us. The balloon has
lost me, I must be on my feet to remain
in the car.

"Peter! Peter! I call to my
friend. "Hold me up, hold me up."
The agitation of the balloon
has loosed the rope and has
snapped back again, snare the cables
in the car, so I can see only the
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
