

BULUWAYO, July 28.—Imperial troops are being hurriedly pushed to the front from Macoutzie and Mangwel and Fort Tuli. The situation is becoming more serious every day.

ZURICH, July 28.—The riot which broke out Saturday arising from the killing of a Swiss by Italians, were renewed yesterday evening and continued all night. An infuriated crowd committed serious excesses in the Italian quarter. The rioters were overpowered by police and military, and fifty men were arrested.

LONDON, July 28.—The jury in the Jameson South African case found all the defendants guilty of violating the foreign enlistment act.

Dr. Jameson was sentenced to fifteen months imprisonment without labor. Major John Willoughby to ten months; and Major White to seven months; Captain Henry F. Coventry, Col. G. B. Grey and Col. H. F. White to five months.

Before the lord chief justice, Baron Russell of Killow, Baron Pollock and Mr. Justice Hawkins, in the queen's bench division of the high court of justice today, the trial of Dr. Jameson, Major John Willoughby, Col. R. Grey, Major John White, Major R. White and Col. H. F. White, charged Capt. Henry F. Coventry, charged with violation of the neutrality laws in invading the territory of the South in the African republic, was concluded. The arguments having been concluded yesterday, the chief justice began summing up today. Lord Russell's remarks were distinctly hostile to the defendants. He began by pointing out that none of the facts in the case against prisoners, had been contested and said there was no doubt in regard to their having taken in or abetted the proceedings at Pitsania and Mafeking, where the invading forces were mustered preparatory to entering Transvaal. It was entirely unimportant in the opinion of Lord Russell, whether a foreign enlistment had been proclaimed at the places named in 1889. There was no doubt the expedition was of a military character and whether it was aimed to overthrow the Transvaal government or force a change of laws in the republic, it was equally an expedition against a friendly state.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., July 28.—When the westward bound Empire state express was about two miles west of Syracuse this afternoon it raced with six athletic young men on a sextuplet. Arrangements for the race were quickly completed several days ago. At this point was a stretch of elnder about four feet wide and a mile and a half long. As soon as the train hove in sight the sextuplet got under way. The "empire" was soon abreast and the race for a quarter of a mile was an even thing. At the end of half a mile the sextuplet was four lengths ahead. The sextuplet was then obliged to slow down, owing to a short bridge a quarter of a mile ahead. A number of railroad officers and bicycle men witnessed the race and four photographs of the race were secured.

HAVANA, July 28.—Gen. A. Rolas is moving his forces toward Marcel, the northern extremity of the military line across that province. Antonio Maceo is also said to be moving his forces along the same general route, which leads people to believe

that he intends crossing the military line, and that Gen. Arleolas will try to prevent him.

A numerous band of insurgents under Zayas, all well armed, is reported to be moving with the intention of making a feint attack upon the southern portion of the military line and eastward, in order to meet Maceo to deliver his attack. Firing has been heard at several points along the military line and it is believed to have been caused by further efforts of the insurgent to draw upon them the attention of as many Spanish troops as possible while Maceo's forces continue their movement toward Marcel.

Marcel Garrillo, P. Farrall and Barrios, insurgent prisoners, have been sentenced to death, after trial by court-martial.

NEW YORK, July 28.—A dispatch to the Herald from Havana says:

The police have captured a collection of maps of the island, highly colored, showing the supposed insurgent headquarters in Cuba, the rebel flag, and picturing various chiefs of the insurrection. The maps bear the imprint of a Barcelona firm. The Havana stationer, Don Fernandez, in whose possession they were found, was arrested.

Narciso Rodriguez Torres, court-martialed here will be shot in the Cabanas fortress today (Wednesday). In Havana province several government foraging parties sent out from Batabo, San Felipe and Aguacate report successful operations against various insurgent camps of minor importance. The rebels' cattle and other effects were seized. Skirmish firing continues along the Trocha. From Pinar Del Rio General Bernal reports that he captured the rebel positions at Poso Del Medio and burned the camp of the insurgent chief, Verona. Bernal secured thirty heaves and a great quantity of tobacco.

A Madrid dispatch to the El Dario Del Marina, says the Argentine Republic refuses to cede to the Spanish government two battle ships nearing completion at Genoa, Italy.
