## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THE EMIGRANTS.**—The Minnesota company of emigrants is expected here to-day. Elder Jesse N. Smith has charge of the company.

**BE PREPARED FOR THEM.**—We are informed that a man, no doubt on dishonest intent, entered the house of Mr. E. Eldredge, in the 16th ward, between two and three o'clock this morning. He had a white handkerchief thrown over his head. He was rather too clumsy, for the noise he made roused some of the inmates, and the scoundrel beat a hasty retreat before he had been able to do any mischief. Probably he has been in the habit of plying his trade in localities where more whisky is imbibed than in Salt Lake, and slumber is heavier. If he be wise this failure will be the only one he will make here; Salt Lake shows very little consideration for the feelings of burglars.

The design of the author is to prove that St. Louis is to be the future great city, not only of this continent, but of the world, his argument being founded upon its geographical, geological and topographical situation, its railway system, the resources of the State, &c., &c., all of which he argues are indubitable indications of the truth of his position.

The perusal of the work will no doubt please many interested in the growth and development of this great western city, but we believe that the author's ideas are chimerical.

**THE TRANSLANTIC.**—Is the title of a monthly magazine, published at four dollars a year by L. K. Hamersley & Co., Philadelphia. It is devoted exclusively to choice extracts and selections from current foreign literature. We have received the August number, being No. 1, Vol. 2, from the publisher. It contains selections from "Belgravia," "Musical Monthly," "Cassell's Magazine," "London Society," "Chambers Journal," "Once a Week," "McMillan's Magazine," "All the Year Round," etc. It is well printed on good paper, and contains 128 pages of closely printed reading matter.

**MATTERS IN HELENA, MA.**—The Herald states that scarcely a day has passed, in that place, during the last month, in which an affray of some kind has not occurred. The last affair of this kind was a shooting scrape. Two colored men, named respectively Ben. Stone and Henry Pyan, indicted by the "green-eyed monster," quarrelled. Stone shot at Pyan with a derringer, but missed his antagonist and hit a minor named Davis. Stone was then set upon by an infuriated crowd, and would doubtless have been killed had it not been for some of the bystanders.

We extract the following in relation to an expedition to the Yellowstone country: "A party has been made up for a trip to the Yellowstone country, and will leave Helena on or about the 15th of this month. Among those from Helena, whom we have heard spoken of in connection with this proposed tour, are General H. D. Washburn, our popular Surveyor General; Samuel T. Hauser, Esq., President of the First National Bank and T. C. Everts, Esq., late Assessor of U. S. Internal Revenue. Deer Lodge will also be represented in the person of James Stewart, the noted Indian fighter, and several others will join the company at Bozeman. We intend also to send a reporter along with the expedition to make sketches and communicate with the Herald from different points. There will be about twenty in the party and it is expected that they will be absent six weeks. Bozeman City will be the outfitting point, and from thence the party will go direct to Yellowstone River; thence up to the falls, and from there to the lake, around the lake to Snake river, and thence home again. General Washburn, we understand, has been selected as commander of the expedition."

**DENVER.**—Our Denver exchanges state that that city is being rapidly improved, and built up and that the demand for mechanics in the building line is, consequently, greater than the supply.

**HORSE THIEVES HUNG.**—At Pueblo Col., two men were found hanging to a telegraph pole lately. They had stolen two horses from a citizen of that place. The owner of the horses, with the assistance of a trapper or thief catcher, named Templeton, tracked the thieves and, after going a long distance, captured them and brought them back towards Pueblo. On the morning after the arrest the bodies were found, as above described. The Colorado Chronicle, from which we obtain this information, expresses the hope that the above example will prove a warning to the many desperate characters who infest that region. The names of the desperadoes were not known, further than that one of them was recognized by the name of Fox.

**THE LUNA THOMPSON TROUPE.**—This Troupe played at Omaha lately. They are pronounced by the Herald as a grand affair. According to that paper, on the first night of their appearance the audience was large, but at subsequent performances they were greeted by "empty benches and applause from the gods."

**INFECTED BUFFALO ROBES.**—It has been stated that the spread of small pox has been much increased at different times, in these Western territories by the transportation of buffalo robes and other articles of that description from places where the disease prevailed, to other parts which were previously free from it. We understand that an order has been made with regard to passing such articles over the Union Pacific R. R. No such articles, we believe, will be allowed to pass over that line until inspected by a government officer. We think this a wise and necessary precaution.
