F. W. NAYLOR INJURED. Mail Carrier Severely Kicked in the

Face by a Horse.

F. W. Naylor, a mail carrier, residing at the corner of Tenth South and Tenth East streets, was kleked in the face his liberty as a cloak under which to by a horse Saturday evening. The flesh was cut to the bone from the chin to the forehead, and the face will be

scarred for life. Mr. Naylor was engaged in hauling hay when the horse he was driving was frightened by a bunch of hay rolling off the wagon. Naylor jumped to the ground to seize hold of the bridle but hefore he could get away from the animal's heels it kicked victously and struck him full in the face. Naylor was rendered unconscious, but was taken to his home by Ole Larsen, and Dr. Glesy, who was summoned, dressed the wounds. It was found necessary to take ten stitches in the face.

EQUALITY BETWEEN SEXES.

Undecided Question as to Whether it Applies to Saloon Patronage.

It at present rests with Judge Stewart of the Third district court to decide whether or not in this state of enfranchised women the ladies of Salt Lake City will have the same privileges of drinking at saloons as their male friends. In the case of the city against Sig Simon, proprietor of the Bismark, and H. Gater, a bartender for Morris Levy, who runs the Court saloon, which was appealed from the police court, where each of the saloon men was fined \$25 for allowing women in their winerooms between the hours proscribed in the city ordinance, from 7 p. m. to 7 a. m., Judge Powers and his partner, D. N. Straup, argued that the ordinance barring women from saans was unconstitutional. City Attorney Stephens answered that the provision was a restriction necessary in the interest of public morals, and warranted by the city's charter.

Peter, ii, 16, "As free, and not using your liberty for a cloak of mallfrom entanglement with any institu-tion or society which would alienate us but as servants of God. also, from Galatians, ili, 13-14, "For brethren, ye have been called unto lib-erty, only use not liberty for an occacfrom the Church and Kingdom of God." After singing, "Guide us, O thou great sion to the fiesh, but by love serve on another." The discourse was prefaced by the familiar story of the rescued, half-frozen serpent, which bit the hand that had saved it, and then the speaker selor Joseph E. Taylor. said: "We had such an exhibition of blind and viperous ingratitude last that intended making a long bloycle trip," says F. L. Taylor, of New Al-bany, Bradford County, Pa.
