COUNCILMEN GET FREE RIDE TODAY Outcome of Delay on Acting Upon Amended Franchise Sought By Streetcar Company. AGAIN ASKED TO PROVE IT.

> Utah Federation of Labor Invited to Appear and Make Good Charges Made Recently.

At the special session of the city council last night there was quite a litthe stir over the delay in acting upon he amended franchise asked for by the Utah Light & Raffway company. Atty. P. L. Williams addressed the council in regard to the matter and urged that two of the extensions asked for in the franchise be granted without further franchise be granted without further delay as they were needed in order for the company to go ahead with its im-provements. The extensions urged are from Fourth West to Second West along Fifth North street, and thence north and east to the gravel beds; also on Fifth South street from Second to Third West to connect with the Ore-gon Short Line railroad and on Fifth South street from Fifth to Sixth East to the site of the company's new barns. gon short Line rainoad and on Fitth South street from Fifth to Sixth East to the site of the company's new barns. The first extension is needed so that the company may secare gravel for ballast-ing its tracks which are being relaid on the streets that are being paved. The second extension is necessary at once for the hauling of material to the new car barn site at Sixth East and Fifth South streets. The granting of these two extensions was opposed by sev-eral members of the council until they had an opportunity to Investigate the matter so the attorney for the company agreed to take them out in carriages to-day to take a look at the streets on which the lines will be extended. The trip was made from the Wilson hotel at 10 o'clock this morning and the coun-cil will probably hold a special meeting to take some action on the matter other the streets of the council

some action on the matter take

to take some action on the matter either this afternoon or tomorrow. The council met in special session to approve the department payrolis for the first half of May, amounting to \$11,-253,95, which was done. Fernstrom then introduced a resolution which provided that the council should grant the two extensions to the company at once and not wait for the considera-tion of the entire franchise. He urged the adoption of his resolution and stat-ed that the franchise had been before the council for a month and no action ed that the franchise had been before the council for a month and no action had been taken on it at all and that it was necessary to grant the extensions mentioned at once so that there would be no delay in public improvements. Mr. Williams explained the import-ance of giving the two extensions with-out delay. Mulvey and Hobday both opposed such action until the council had had an opportunity to investigate the matter thoroughly.

THREE FOREST RESERVES.

Land Office Receives Proclamations Issued by President Roosevelt.

The local United States land office is it receipt of three more presidential proc-amations relative to the establishment of national forests in this state, viz.; the Beaver, Manti and Fish Lake national

Beaver, Manti and Fish Lake national forests. The documents say: Excepting from the force and effect of this proclamation all lands which are at this date embraced in any legal entry or covered by any lawful filing or selection fully of record in the proper United States land office, or upon which any ralid settlement has been made pursuant to law, if the statutory period within which to make entry or filing of record has not expired; and also excepting all ands which at this date are embraced within any withdrawal or reservation for ands which at this date are valor within any withdrawal or reservation any use or purpose with which this re-vation for forest uses is inconsiste provided, that these exceptions shall continue to apply to any particular to or fand unless the entryman, action aiman aw under which ement was made, on or withdrawal ion or withdrawal with which this reser-ration is inconsistent continues in force; not excepting from the force and effect of this proclamation, however, any part of the national forcet hereby catablashed which has been withdrawn to protect the coal therein, but this proclamation for a state of the second land with-frawal; and provided that these excep-tions shall not apply to any land em-praced in any selection; entry, or filling, which has been permitted to remain of record subject to the creation of a per-maneth reservation.

After the special meeting adjourned the committees got together and transacted some routine business. The same committee instructed The same committee instructed Street Supervisor Raleigh to go ahead and enforce the Fernstrom resolu-tion which orders all fences and walls moved back to the property line throughout the entire city. In many instances people have put in lawns out to the sidewalks and have fenced the plot in or put in concrete walls out to the sudwards and have tended the plot in or put in concrete walls right up against the walk thus tak-ing in about five feet of the street. It is where such encroachments exist that the supervisor will remove the obstruction unless the property own-er obeys his order in the matter.

ONE POLE ALLOWED.

ONE POLE ALLOWED. The streets and engineering com-mittees decided to allow the Utah Light and Railway company to place one ornamental pole in the middle of the intersection of the streets in the business district from which the trolley wires will be suspended. It was at first decided to have the poles placed on the sides of the streets, but where there are several curves re-quiring trolley wires this plan would not be practicable so the committee decided to permit the use of one pole in the middle of each intersection in the business district. It was decided to concur in the recommendation of the board of pub-lic works in regard to paving the in-

the works in regard to paving the in-tersections at Third South and Main and Third South and West Temple streets and the work will be done without delay at a cost of about \$5,-box

P. J. Moran was allowed \$2,250 by the finance committee last night for extras on the Big Cottonwood conduit. The extras were for rip-rapping along the conduit at certain points and for force work.
