

BENT ON MISCHIEF.—The passage of the Utah bill by a large vote shows that there is mischief ahead for Utah. Judge Crounse did well to protest against the most outrageous of its provisions, but it was vain. The people of Utah have wrestled with the infamous gangs that have been imposed upon that Territory for the last six years successfully, and now they are to be punished by fresh agencies of persecution for doing it. Poland is the most implacable enemy of the Mormon people as well as the most contemptible. He is a man after the heart of Judge McKean, who is one of the most ignorant as well as one of the most infamous men that ever undertook to deal out law and justice from any hand. —*Omaha Herald, June 4.*

A BLOW AT POLYGAMY IN UTAH.—Washington, June 2.—The House to-day struck a decisive blow at polygamy in Utah, by the passage of a bill, reported from the Judiciary Committee, in relation to the courts and judicial affairs of that Territory. Mr. Holland reported the bill and extolled its moderation.

Delegate Cannon of Utah opposed the bill. This was his maiden speech and it was listened to with a good deal of interest. He claimed that there was no necessity for the passage of the bill, and said Congress had been memorialized to send a committee to investigate the facts, showing that the Mormons are not afraid of the closest scrutiny. —*San Francisco Chronicle.*
