Articles of incorporation of the Ogden Furniture and Carpet company were filed today with the county clerk with a capital stock of \$100,000. The corporation virtually absorbs the E. stratford & Sons Furniture company and promises to be one of the largest and most complete establishments in the State. The capital stock of \$100,000 is divided into 1,000 shares of the par value of \$100 per share. Already shares of the capital stock have be abscribed for and the other 600 shares will remain as treasury stock to be dis of as the officers of the corportion may deem best.

The incorporators and the number of shares of capital stock subscribed for each is as follows: David Eccles, Thomas D. Dee, 70, H. H. Spencer, James Pingree, 55, Job Pingree, 25, L. Wattis, 20, Willard Snow, 30, J. Stratford, 30, E. C. Stratford, 30, C. Kircher, 10, Peter Anderson, 10, John Ellis, 10.

The officers of the corporation elected for the ensuing year are Thomas D. Dee, president; H. H. Spencer, vice president; James Pingree, secretary and treasurer and they, with David Eccles and Egbert C. Stratford, form the board of directors, and Willard Snow, general manager. The new corporation will for the pres-

ent occupy the same building which the stratford firm has occupied, but it will e remodeled and put in first class condition for the new firm. Interesting Course of Lectures by Dr. John Dewey of Chicago University.

#### Subjects to be Discussed During the Week - City Council Business -Weddings-Divorce Wanted.

Special Correspondence.

Provo, Utah Co., June 18th .-- Dr. John Dewey delivered his first lecture yesterday afternoon before the B. Y. academy summer school, to an audience of between three and four hundred. A larger audience attended his evening ecture

Dr. Dewey is a very interesting speaker, and commands the closest attention of his audience; his style is conversational without any effort at oratorical embelishments and he gives the impression of one who thoroughly understands his subject and who can make others understand-a perfect example of impression and expression.

## AFTERNOON LECTURE.

Dr. Dewey announced that the lecture would be on psychological topics bear-ing on education, to show how it is the mind learns, and what it is that hap-pens when the mind learns.

The knowledge of the process by which the mind learns ought to be of as great help to the teacher as the knowledge of how the plants grow and gather nourishment from nature is to scientific gardener and farmer. Teachers have special interest in the process of learning; learning and teach-

ing go together, as does buying and selling. Children are learning all the time regardless of the school room; the mind learns when there is no intention of doing so, simply by natural accumu-The baby has no intention of ation. learning for the first three or four years of its life, yet it learns rapidly during that period.
