

IDAHO'S NEW SUGAR COMPANY

It Will be Incorporated Next Week With a Million Dollars Capital and Bear the Name of Fremont County Sugar Company.

A second sugar factory for the state of Idaho, several mentions of which have been made in the "Evening" is now an assured fact, and the company to erect it will be incorporated in Salt Lake next week.

The enterprise had its birth in Fremont county, through the enterprise of the leading men of Rexburg, St. Anthony, Teton, Salmon and the Elgin. They took the best possible way to interest capitalists, by securing a first class site for the factory, and then having respectable farmers sign pledges to plant at least 5,000 acres of beets for the factory for a term of five years. Armed with these pledges, a committee entered negotiations with Mr. T. R. Cutler, manager of the Utah Sugar company, and the Idaho Sugar company, and Mr. Mark Austin, resident manager of the last named concern. The negotiations were so successful that matters were soon brought to a head. All the capital necessary was subscribed within a few days, and the company will be incorporated with the following list of officers: President, Joseph F. Smith; vice president and general manager, T. R. Cutler; secretary and treasurer, Horace G. Whitney; members of the board, W. S. McCornick, John R. Winder, John Henry Smith, H. J. Grant, and John C. Cutler. The authorized capital will be \$1,000,000, divided into 10,000 shares at \$100 each. Of this, \$750,000 has been subscribed, the remainder will be held in the treasury. The first 10 per cent will be paid in immediately, and the necessary papers are now being prepared by attorney Richard W. Young. The eastern investors interested in the Utah and Idaho companies will also be interested in this.

The title of the company will be the Fremont County Sugar company. The main office will be Salt Lake City, Utah, and the location of the works will be almost midway between Rexburg and St. Anthony on the St. Anthony branch of the Oregon Short Line, 20 miles north of the factory near Idaho Falls. It will also be very close to the towns of Salmon and Teton, and will thus be immediately tributary to the famous Elgin branch, noted for its wonderful soil and its fine irrigation facilities. The whole country, in fact, is one of the best watered in the entire west. The plan will be to erect the factory next year in time to handle the crop of 1904. This will entitle the company to secure the bounty of one-half cent per pound, which the legislature offered to encourage the sugar industry in the state of Idaho. The present Idaho Sugar company, which will operate this year, secures the bounty of one cent per pound for the first year's run, but the second year is reduced to one-half cent per pound, and after that the bounty ceases entirely. The new factory will be a duplication of the one now being built near Idaho Falls, with a daily capacity of 600 tons of beets, capable of being enlarged to 1,200 tons at short notice.

A dispatch from Rexburg states that last night a big celebration took place there in honor of the proposed factory. There was no hall in the town large enough to accommodate the people, hence a meeting was held in the open air, the speakers being Maj. R. W. Young, Mark Austin, Judge French, President T. R. Cutler, Prof. Christensen and Judge Rickles. The whole surrounding country came in to join in the celebration.

This morning a complaint was filed against one R. L. McClain, charging him with housebreaking. It is alleged that he broke into a rooming house a few nights ago and stole a suit of clothes valued at \$30. He was arraigned and entered a plea of not guilty.
