LEGAL NOTICE!

In the District Court in and for the Third Judicial District, Territory of Utah.

The Hilliard Thum and Lumber Company, plaintiff,

William H. Burris and Louis Bennett, defendants.

The People of the United States, in the Territory of Utah, and Greeting:

To William H. Burris and Louis Bennett, defendants: You are hereby notified to appear in an action brought against you by the above named plaintiff, in the District Court of the Third Judicial District of the Territory of Utah, and to answer the complaint filed therein within ten days, exclusive of the day of service, after the service on you of this summons, if served within this County; or, if served out of this County but in this district, within twenty days; otherwise, within forty days, or judgment by default will be taken against you, according to the prayer of said complaint.

The said action is brought to recover \$3,000 railroad freight on Haydon's Fork of Bear River, in Summit County, Utah Territory, marked "H" or "B", or for seven thousand dollars, the value thereof, and for five thousand dollars damages for the destruction of said freight.

And you are hereby notified that if you fail to appear and answer the said complaint as above required, the said plaintiff will take judgment against you for the value thereof, and for \$3,000 damages and for costs of suit.

LOCAL SELF-GOVERNMENT IN THE TERRITORIES.

Speech of Hon. William L. Steele, of Wyoming, in the House of Representatives, Saturday, July 29, 1878.

(CONTINUED)

It is well for us in this year to look back to the principles upon which this government was founded, and to see what it was that caused the feeble colonies to throw off the government of the mother country and lay in suffering, privation and blood the foundation of this great Republic; and it would be well for all to see that the principles lying at the foundation of our political fabric are not lost in this land in this centennial year.

Sir, what was it that led to the revolt of the colonies? Without doubt, the immediate and immediate detail of the long struggle of the colonies to maintain their charters and liberties, the main-spring of all their action may be said to have been—

No taxation without representation and a demand for the right of local self-government.

The first congress of the colonies met October 7, 1765, in the city of New York, and on the 19th of that month published the "Declaration of Rights," Article 2 of which declared—

That His Majesty's subjects in these colonies are entitled to all the rights and liberties of a natural born subject within the Kingdom of Great Britain.

Article 3 protested against the right of taxation without representation.

The immortal Declaration of Independence, in which the colonies appealed to the laws of nature and of mankind, announces it to be a self-evident truth—

That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness; that to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.

It is now one hundred years since this great declaration of human rights was formulated; and it would be well to ask ourselves, Is there within the laws of the republic any system of government established by the Congress which violates the principles upon which this government was established? Have the United States any colonies? If so, are the people of the colonies denied the right of local self-government and subjected to taxation without representation; and do the governments of the colonies derive their just powers from the consent of the governed?

And if these questions should be answered so as to show that the territorial plan of government violates the fundamental principles of our system of government; that the Territories are essentially colonies and are subjected to taxation without representation; that there is no self-government in the Territories; that the people of the Territories are denied the right of local self-government and subjected to taxation without representation; and that the governments of the Territories derive their just powers from the consent of the governed?

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
