ENCYCLICAL ON "MODERNISM"

Pope Pius X Issues One, Saying it
Is a Serious Danger to the
Church.

SYNTHESIS OF ALL HERESY.

Leads to Atheism—Clergy and
Faithful Not to be Allowed
To Read Modernist Books

Ecclesiastical Congresses, Except on
Rare Occasions, Prohibited—Councils in Each Diocese.

Rome, Sept. 16.—The Observatore Romano, organ of the Vatican today said an important encyclical of Pope Pius X on "Modernism," which really is a compilation of his recent syllabus, the document sets forth that modernism is a serious danger to the church, refers in detail to the various features of modernism, condemns its as dangerous in philosophy, faith, theology, history, criticism and reforms, and arrives at the conclusion that modernism is a synthesis of all heresy and non-orthodox lead to atheism. The encyclical makes the following provisions:

1. The teaching of philosophy, positive theology, etc., is to be carried on in the church schools and universities, but in a Catholic spirit.

2. Modernists are to be removed from professorships and the direction of educational institutions.

3. The clergy and faithful are not to be allowed to read modernist publications.

4. A committee of censorship is to be established in every diocese, to pass upon the publications which the clergy and faithful shall be permitted to read.

5. The encyclical of the late Pope Leo XIII, prohibiting the clergy from assuming the direction of publications without their bishops' permission and providing for supervision of the work of ecclesiastical writers, is confirmed.

6. Ecclesiastical congresses, except on rare occasions, are prohibited.

7. A council is to be constituted in every diocese to combat modernism.

REMARKABLE STORY ABOUT
THE PRINCE DE CHIMAY.

About Half of Those Injured Have
Left the Hospital.

Chicago, Sept. 16.—Mrs. Mary Martin of Oakland, Cal., who spent Sunday at a Chicago hotel, is quoted as telling a large story about Clara Ward, daughter of the Prince de Chimay, who married and was divorced from the Prince de Chimay and whose escapades and marriage with subsequent divorce of a violinist named Russo, caused an immense amount of gossip. Mrs. Martin's published story is that one of the two children whom the prince had had in his first marriage was a child of princesses, but of a poor Irish woman. The assertion is that in 1891, when the wife of the prince, the princess, gave birth to a son in a New York hospital, but substituted a girl for him sending the boy out into the world unnamed and unknown. My. Martin was accompanied yesterday by the son of the Prince and Princess de Chimay, who she asserted is the son of the Prince and Princess de Chimay.

Mrs. Martin is quoted as saying that though her home in Oakland is guarded day and night by two Filipinos, and though the Ward relatives are bound to fulfils purposes, she is determined that at any cost the son of the prince will be safe in his right.

Thomas R. Lyons, executor of the Ward estate and uncle of Clara, says he has known of Mrs. Martin's story and that it is absolutely false. He adds that his niece is living in Italy with her husband, Giuseppe Ricciari, and that the children of the prince and wife are still in the world. He says Mrs. Martin has frequently written him asking for money.

MODERN WOODMEN.

Each Camp Asked to Initiate Twenty-Five Members on Jan. 5.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 16.—Supreme Consul A. H. Talbot, of the Modern Woodmen, today issued from headquarters at Rock Island, Ill., a proclamation asking all of the 12,000 camps of his order to hold anniversary celebrations on Jan. 5. He asks each camp to initiate 25 members on that date, bringing the total membership to more than 1,000,000.

PHILADELPHIA BAPTISTS.

Raise \$100,000 Fund for Church Extension and Missionary Work.

Philadelphia, Sept. 16.—A fund of \$100,000 for church extension and missionary work has been raised within the past year by the Baptists of Philadelphia to commemorate the two hundredth anniversary of the formation of the Philadelphia Baptist association. So great has been the response that it is expected the contributions will greatly exceed \$100,000. The money will be turned over to the various church enterprises during the anniversary celebration which will begin Oct. 1, and continue a week.

Appraisers' Inventory Shows Gross Value of Assets \$1,061,000.

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 16.—A hearing on the confirmation of Capt. Albert G. Pease as temporary receiver of the Pope Manufacturing company, in Connecticut, was adjourned today before Judge Case of the state court of appeals. Appraisers John R. Hill and Fredrick S. Ballings filed their inventory of the assets, plant, machinery, equipment, tools and patterns shown on hand or in process of manufacture, material, etc. It being held that as the concern is a foreign corporation, those items should be taken as other assets to be inventoried, with the same as the company located in the state of New Jersey, due to the stock accounts, bills receivable, cash on hand or in process of manufacture, which includes about 300 cars ready for the appraisers await the orders of the court.
