In Women's World.

A beautiful snow globe makes a most fascinating spectacle. If the presenters are long on it they must be done up in white paper and tied with white ribbons. From the top hang white garlands, which may be held in long places for about 5 cents apiece, or the cotton may be pulled down to represent icicles. The silver dust may be used to drap the trees and other objects, or can completely be decorations. Instead of a silver and white tree we can have a gold and white tree, with gold dust, stars, comets, etc., and the white packages tied with gold cord.

Oatmeal Porridge—Porridge made from ordinary oatmeal should be cooked for one full hour; the flaked variety is minutes to one-half hour. Season with a little salt and serve with cream and a little sugar.

Eggs—Place enough water in a small saucepan to entirely cover an egg when it has reached the boiling point remove from the stove and drop in a fresh egg; let this remain in the water five or six minutes, then remove and take immediately from the shell; mix with oil and season with a little salt.

SOME HYGIENIC SCHOOL INNOVATIONS.

Germany and Swiss Movement to Improve Health of Students.
Having that the maintenance of better general health during childhood is a highly important matter, the German T. J. Albert of Brunswick describes some of the plans to further this aim being carried out in Germany and Switzerland.

In 1906, and a suburb of Berlin, this movement for the first time in a public school, instruction free of charge is extending, but has been given to the children. The health municipality will establish a model school, which will be distinguished from the others by being a complete training school, where the pupils will receive the same instruction as in the other schools, but with the addition of physical education. The children of children's health and school hygiene at the approaching congress for health and hygiene will be more broadly considered than heretofore. During the general holidays increased attention has been given to juvenile sports and recreation in the country.

The Prussian minister of public instruction has issued a direction worthy of imitation. In order to prevent as far as possible the injurious effects of long sitting in the school, the director is recommended to be safely carried through. The exercises are to last five to ten minutes, which time is to be added to suitable pauses between lessons. The bodily exercises are to be in the open air or in a closed room after thorough ventilation.

In Switzerland the city of Berne has established a permanent exhibition for school hygiene in the city school. The Liberal School union has adopted a resolution demanding obligatory instruction in swimming for the upper classes of the public schools, the election of school sanitarians, and the completion of the institute for school physicians. The city of St. Gall has made a trial of special classes graded according to the mental capacity of the children, similar to Mannheim model.
