

GUS RUHLIN AND WILLE TO MEET.

Big Fellows Signed Up Last Night For a Twenty Round Contest.

BOUT SET FOR SEPTEMBER 27.

Akron Giant Will Train in Salt Lake, While His Opponent Will Go to Ogden Canyon.

"Curry went to San Francisco primarily to get a match for Wille with the winner of the Britt-Nelson bout. It is believed upon good authority that he failed to get Nelson to sign for a fight with Wille for the immediate future, but that a battle between the two men is likely at a distant date.

The above startling announcement was made by an "authority" yesterday. Rumor has it that a big mistake has been made. Nelson, it is understood, refused point blank to make weight for Wille. The latter weighs in the neighborhood of 180 pounds, while Nelson tips the scales at 200 or 210.

Of course, if the statement that "a battle between the two men is likely at a distant date" be true, there will be much speculation as to how "distant" the date will be. If put far enough ahead, Wille may become a featherweight and Nelson may become a heavyweight. If Wille and Nelson should fight it would probably be for the title of feather-light-heavyweight-heavyweight or middle-weight-heavyweight.

Britt, who had put up a wonderfully good fight, fell to the floor and was unable to regain his feet.

Nelson is a champion fighter, said Curry, and Billy Nelson is a champion runner. One out-generaled and the other out-fought the latter.

Manager Curry expects to go to Chicago to attend to some important business affairs. While Curry is away, Wille will be training in Ogden Canyon.

Mike Schreck trained, Manager Currier for Ruhlman will locate training quarters in Salt Lake. There has been some talk to the effect that Ruhlman might train at Lakewood, but the public can watch him.

This is regarded as a most important battle to a championship fight. The winner, provided there is a decisive victory, will meet here in a championship fight. Wille will be compelled to meet the victor as the fight fans throughout the country will demand it.

WANT NO RINGERS ON MADDOCK'S TEAM

Athletic Council Agrees That First Duty is to Keep Game Clean.

WILL FENCE FOOTBALL FIELD

Improvements to Keep Crowd Off the Gridiron During Progress of Big Games.

That no man is to be allowed on an athletic team of the University of Utah, who is not at the University primarily for study, and that no money will be paid any member of a team under any guise to keep him at the University for athletic purposes, was a conclusion reached last night in a conference at the Y. M. C. A. building.

The conference was called to outline policies for the season of 1905, and there were present those interested in athletics in the board of regents, in the faculty and among the students.

Couch Maddock talked for some time on general athletics and the training team matter was fully discussed. It being decided to go ahead at once with the construction of the campus, a decision is to be taken on the matter of the new school building, pending the completion of the gymnasium.

TO FENCE GRIDIRON.

Another thing which will add much to the attractiveness of the University of Utah was decided upon. It was to erect a massive, four-foot, board fence completely around the field just inside of the bleachers. Its purpose is to keep back the crowd, which usually drags around the players at the games, and to make the view of those behind.

NO RINGERS WANTED.

It was when the question of the personnel of the team came up, that the most decisive stand was taken, when it was decided that the first duty of the regents and faculty would be to keep athletics clean, and the second duty would be to win. Dr. C. G. Chandler, of the board of regents stated that it was in his power to keep clean athletes, but he would not do so if the University of Utah would come primarily for school work, he declared, and not a cent of money must be paid under any guise for any athletic work. The talk of Dr. Chandler was heartily endorsed by all present.

THANKSGIVING GAME HERE.

A final point of future policy was set, that when it was decided that the future of the University team should never again be away from Salt Lake on Thanksgiving day. That game, the season, and it was thought, ought to come on some grounds.

The picture shows a replica of a silver gilt cup presented to Martin Luther and his bride by the city of Wittenberg. It has been presented by some public spirited German-American to Harvard University. Inside the lid is a medal bearing the likeness of the great reformer. The inscription records the fact that it was given to Martin Luther and his bride by the city of Wittenberg on the occasion of their nuptials in 1523. This marriage was approved by the independent citizens of the town, and they showed their appreciation in this manner. After the death of the reformer, the relic passed to a member of the Bora family and is now in the possession of one of her descendants.
