Jeffries Will Meet Johnson If He Can Condition Himself.

HE IS NOT CERTAIN YET.

Says "I Must Have More Time Before I Will Make Any Definite Plans."

Chicago, March 1.—"I will fight Jack Johnson if the world will have me," said James J. Jeffries, who stopped off on his way to New York today.

"The story from Omaha that I said I would fight Johnson as soon as I finished my vanderbilt engagement is not true," continued Jeffries. "I never have said definitely I would fight Johnson, and I am not ready to do so now. My future depends on my ability to get into condition and I am not certain yet whether I will be able to do myself justice if I go into the ring. I must have more time to train. I have been offered a good sum to appear in an exhibition bout, but I am not certain it will be enough to cover my expenses before I will make any definite plans."

"I am appearing in an excellent condition, but somewhat heavy. He was accompanied by Mrs. Jeffries and Sam Berger, his sparring partner.

**GANG OF SWINDLERS
POSITIVELY IDENTIFIED**

Little Rock, Ark., March 1.—The victims of the alleged gang of swindlers under arrest here are today arriving in Little Rock, and all of them have identified J. C. Mayratus, the alleged, and others of the quartet. G. Kile, of Des Moines, Iowa, was one of the men who was arrested Feb. 18, identified all of the men under arrest. ARTIFICIAL ICE RINK.

One To Be Built at Chicago for Hockey And Skating Fans.

Chicago, March 2.—After several seasons of delayed hope, hockey and skating enthusiasts appear to be certain of realizing their desire for an artificial ice rink.

Two ordinances have been passed by the city council, one providing for a permit to the Metropolitan railroad system to use its tracks for a rink, the other for a skating rink, the other arranging for a 20-year franchise for the rink itself. An effort will be made to start a skating rink in the fall, and the Association of Skating Masters, who have recently been working with Dr. Alexander Graham Bell at Baddeck, N. S.
