AUTOMOBILE RECORDS. London, Dec. 19.-On the Brooklands racing track at Weybridge, which was built especially for automobile speeding and where recently S. A. Edge traveled List miles and L30 sards in twenty-four hours-a marvelous performance-Clifford Earp today set up a number of world's records.
