UTAH SHEEP ARE SOLD. Assessor and Sheriff in Nevada Auction

Them for Taxes and License, Under the provisions of the state law Assessor J. B. Williamson on Thursday last sold 173 of the 1,000 sheep levled upon by him a few days previous in Snake Valley to satisfy the taxes due on the bunch of 2,000 or more for the year 1961. As stated last week, the sheep were the property of the Deep Creek Farm & Livestock company of Utah, and for some time past they have been ranging in the vicinity of Snake Valley, the owners neglecting to pay either taxes or license in this state as required by law. When Assessor Williamson and Sher-

iff Newman learned of the violation of the law they immediately started out, and, locating the herds, made demana for the amounts due: and as the money was not forthcoming, the levy and sale followed. The sheep were bid in by Geo. W. Baker at \$1.50 per head, and out of the proceeds, amounting to \$259.50, the taxes and costs were paid.
