MISSISSIPPI.

Columbus, 5.—Lowmeyer County

elects a full democratic county

ticket. There was a very light

vote polled. There was no opposi-

tion except for senator.

Oxford, Miss., 5.—Lafayette

County gives the democrat 350

majority. The election passed off

quietly.

Jackson, 5.—But 14 counties have

been heard from. Of these 11 elect

the straight democratic ticket,

with a majority of 5,800. Hinds

and Madison require official count.

Holmes is conceded to the green-

back, with the exception of the

county. Marshall County, con-

ceded the stronghold of the green-

backers, elects the full democratic

ticket by a large majority. The

election passed off quietly. A

small vote was cast. But little en-

thusiasm existed, except in coun-

ties where the whites are about

equally divided.
