CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

Distribution of Public Docu-

ments, &c.

WASHINGTON, 2.—The Senate

took up Anthony's bill for the dis-

tribution of public documents.

Mr. Wright moved, to-morrow,

to-morrow, call up the bill declar-

ing the true intent and meaning of

the Union Pacific railroad acts.

Morrill, of Maine, from the com-

mittee on pensions, reported the

pension appropriation bill, with an

amendment reducing pension

agents' fees from thirty cents to

twenty-five, instead of twenty, as

fixed by the House.

Logan, from the committee on

military affairs, reported favorably

to the bill to further control the

provision of the House bill, authorizing

the secretary of the interior to set

aside a reservation for the Indians

roaming in Northern California, on

which they may establish homes

and retain the same, and appropri-

ating an additional sum of \$5,000

for agricultural purposes thereon,

which was struck out by the sen-

ate committee on appropriations,

reinstated, with a modification

leaving the matter discretionary

with the secretary of the interior;

the motion was lost and the bill

remains on the calendar.

When the morning hour expired

the consideration of the Indian ap-

propriation bill was resumed. A

number of minor amendments,

which were reported by the com-

mittee, were agreed to, and the

bill was reported to the Senate.

Hager moved that the provision

of the House bill, authorizing the

secretary of the interior to set

aside a reservation for the Indians

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
