FORGER RETURNS TO JAIL.

Ogden, Sept. 4.—"Pudd'nhead" De Pue as Frank H. De Pue is familiarly mown, passed through this city last light with Fred F. Dellaser, an es-aned convict from the San Quentin Dellaser, and the San Quentin issue when the sen quentin prison. Delisser surrendered himself at Grand Junction and is now being taken back to California. Delisser was sentenced in 1903 to serve five years for forgery. He was released on parole in December, 1906, when within 20 days of complete liberty he forged a number of checks, cashed them and disappeared. A few days later he surrondered himself to the Grand Junction officials saying he was tired of playing at hide-and-seek with the prison officials. The detective tak-ing him back to prison is California's great finger print expert and criminal hunter.
