Announcement of the New Agreement With Japan is The Cause.

EX-EMPEROR SPOILED DESPOT

Says Viscount Hayashi-He Also Says That Korea's Fate Should be a Lesson to China.

Seoul, July 25 .- The Korean anthill has been stirred to the very center by the ex-emperor's second pledge of abdication. A wave of great excitement swept over the whole peninsula today when the new agreement with Japan was announced and the emperor's proclamation published in

All the provinces. All the privileged old ladies at-tached to the court arrived in crowds at the palace, condoling, weeping, wailing and incidentally carrying away in their customary loose clothing everything detachable and portable. The palace was looted of all possible

and was then unable to continue his speech. Knowing that the affairs of state had passed to a new administration, he commended to the cabinet's be-nign care, his son, the new omperor. Viscount Hayashi, the Japanese minister of foceign affairs, received the Associated Press correspondent to-day and in the interview on the Korean situation said that the new agree-ment contained Japan's whole program in Korea. His mission accomplished, he said he would return to Japan on the first ship from Chemulpo; that matters now devolve upon Marquis Ito, who was more than a premier and whose responsibilities had more than doubled, adding that Japan's responsibilities in Korea were now enormous. Continuing, Count Hay-ashi said: ashi said:

"The provisions of the new agree-ment were anticipated in the protec-torate agreement of 1905 and complete

ment were anticipated in the protec-torate agreement of 1905 and complete our obligations with the accompany-ing responsibility to protect. The Hague Korean deputation was in-herently unimportant, only showing the urgent necessity of a close control of the throne. The cabinet is expect-ed to continue the work of purification of the court. In the matter of sep-arating the emperor and ex-emperor, the cabinet is solely concerned. "In regard to the feeling in Japan about the new convention, the people are indoubtedly sufficiently critical, but the agreement ought to sasisfy all rea-sonable Japanese as it ends a long im-possible situation. The ex-emperor was a spoiled despot: always intent upon the selfish exploitation of his nation. The power of the emperor and throne has been diminished. It is now possi-ble to regulate all of the emperor's and ex-emporer's acts. The most import-ant thing to be accomplished is judi-cial reform, and providing for a separation of fudicial magisterial and administrative affalrs which is an ur-gent necesity. Other matters, per-haps, are of less importance, such as taking control of the Korean arm and administering of finances and the af-fairs of the imperial househould." Touching upon the American ques-tion, Viscount Hayashi said: "It is a fact that the Japanese peo-nie have forgotten the American ques-

We shall do it, and woe be to the man that first attempts to steal a body!" "We shall keep right on asking bids upon the property," said H. B. KAISER'S MANEUVERS WILL BE INNOVATING.

Berlin, July 26.-Germany's chief military maneuvers, known as the Kais-er's maneuvers, will take place in Po-sen in September. They will be nota-ble for exhaustive trials of innovations in war methods. Airships are to be utilized to the utmost, while bicycles, besides being employed for reconnoiter-ing, will be tested in executing sur-prise attacks on infantry. They will carry machine guns, partly with a view to ascertaining whether they can be satisfactorily substituted for cavalry. Madiographic telephones will be ex-perimented, while armor clad towers containing rapid-fire guns on revolving platforms, will be utilized.

A DETERMINED SUICIDE. Stockton, Cal., July 25.—Supervisor Henry B, Knight of the Fifth district of San Joaquin county committed sui-cide this morning at his ranch near Lathrop, by shooting. He got up and dressed himself and, without telling any one of his intentions, stepped out-doors and shot himself in the left breast. The shot apparently did not strike a fatal spot, and the desperate man deliberately threw another shell into the gun and took a second shot, failing dead without a word. The two shots were near together, one striking the heart. The deceased was a pros-perous farmer and leaves a widow and children. He was serving this third term as supervisor. Nervous prostration, owing to overwork, is given by the family as the cause for his act.
