

IRRIGATION AMENDS

One Provides That Holders of Water Rights Must Begin Work Within 60 Days.

MUST ALSO FILE A GOOD BOND

Outlook for Sugar Plant in Boise Valley And One at Payette is Very Bright.

Boise, Idaho, April 4.—At the last session of the legislature there were enacted nine measures, all bearing on the subject of irrigation, amending or modifying former laws. One of the most important changes was in regard to the time granted the holder of a water right, in which to begin work upon the construction of his ditch. Any person holding a permit from the state engineer to divert less than 25 second feet of water, must begin work upon his ditch within 60 days after the issuance of such permit and must keep the way open for construction in progress, unless hindered by circumstances over which he has no control. Again, if his permit calls for more than 25 cubic feet per second, he must, within 60 days, file with the state engineer his bond for \$10,000 or thereabout, left to the discretion of the state engineer.

Another amendment, which provides for a maximum amount of water to be set for use for irrigation purposes, is set for use for each second for each 50 acres of land. This naturally makes provision for great economy in the use of water in irrigated districts, and the 60 day limit in which to begin the construction work on ditches, will prevent speculators from holding water claims for the purpose of speculation and not development.

The outlook for the installing of at least two sugar plants, one in the Boise valley and one at Payette, is very bright. The establishment of a factory at Payette is practically a sure thing. The energetic work of Messrs. Parkinson and Austin has been the chief motive power in bringing this project to the attention of the legislature. The House postoffice is now to be raised to the rank of first class. The postoffice in this city and ending yesterday were \$11,273.27. Deputy State Auditor, E. J. Merrill, tendered his resignation yesterday and George Lewis of Bannock county has been appointed to assist Auditor Brannan in the office.

After two weeks of continual storm, Boise is again wrapped in sunshine.

INSANE MAN SOUGHT

LIFE OF GOV. HOCH

Topoka, Kas., April 4.—An insane man, who gives his name as J. Everest Worthington, whose former place of residence the police have been unable to determine, was captured yesterday within a block of the state house, where he said he was going to kill Gov. E. W. Hoch. The man was unarmed, but is of powerful build, and undoubtedly would have handled the chief executive roughly had he not been intercepted. The news of the capture was withheld by the police until today.

Worthington is now in the county jail and will be sent to carry out his sentence. Communication with him will be by means of written question and answers in regard to what his purpose was with the governor. Worthington said:

"I was inspired by Pyrus, the god of fire, to come here and kill Gov. Hoch. I have sworn eternal vengeance against all statesmen who pretend they are self-made men. It had been for this office who captured me, Gov. Hoch would have been no more, for I was on my way to the capitol to kill him when I was arrested. One who has

ATTEMPTED MURDER. Unknown Man Shoots Wounded Policeman in a Hospital. Warsaw, April 4.—While every one was asleep last night in the hospital in which are the three policemen who were injured by the explosion of a bomb which was thrown into the police station at Parga, a suburb of Warsaw, on Sunday, March 26, an unknown man entered the ward and went to the bedside of Policeman Sarap, at whom he fired his revolver three times. One shot took effect in the policeman's back. The assailant escaped before the patients and attendants had time to recover from the shock and surprise. Sarap has been especially hated on account of his brutality in the recent riots.

Against Tax on Corn Meal. London, April 4.—In the house of commons tonight a resolution disapproving in principle of the taxation of corn meal and dairy products and declaring that any colonial conference entered upon except on the understanding that the country will not agree to such taxation, will result in failure, was carried unanimously. The government followed the tactics adopted in previous discussions of fiscal resolutions, and the ministerial benches were deserted.

ZEBULON PIKE'S BODY. Movement Started to Remove it to Colorado. Colorado Springs, Colo., April 4.—A movement has been started here through the local chamber of commerce to have the remains of Lieut. Zebulon Montgomery Pike, the discoverer of Pike's Peak, removed to Colorado and interred in this city or on the summit of the great eminence which bears his name. The body of Lieut. Pike is buried at Lawrenceburg, Ind., where it lies in a practically neglected grave.

Ormsby have been designated by the executive committee of the association to make a trip of inspection of the corrals, feeding yards and stockyards on the Union Pacific and Oregon Short Line. C. I. Tuttle and Mr. Lane will accompany them on their trip.

The Union Pacific Railroad company announced last night in New York that a special meeting of its stockholders will be held at Salt Lake City, Utah, on May 5, at noon, for the purpose of amending the articles of incorporation of the company, increasing its preferred capital stock by \$100,000,000 and of authorizing the issue and use of the additional stock.

C. H. Sporre, general passenger and ticket agent of the Colorado Midland, was in Salt Lake yesterday looking over the new office here. He stated that the Midland has opened an agency at Los Angeles with Mahony Joyce from the San Francisco office in charge of district freight and passenger agent. The agency has been established to capture some of the business which will originate on the Salt Lake Route.

Following the tactics utilized during the friendly squabble over the west side franchise and right-of-way a couple of years ago, the Oregon Short Line has ditched a boxcar in the Ogden yards right across the proposed spur of the Rio Grande to the Simons Hardware warehouse. Apparently the trouble originated through the Rio Grande applying to the city council for the necessary franchise before consulting the Oregon Short Line.

M. B. Quinn, secretary-treasurer of the Mahler Laid & Livestock company, was in the city Wednesday. In conversation with the Argus editor he stated that his company would begin shearing April 14 at J. L. Seawood's in Barron valley, and when that section was cleared up the shearing machines would be moved to Road canyon for the season. He stated that adding the amount of sheep to be sheared contracted with those owned by the company would amount to over 100,000 head. All of the wool will be delivered to Ontario and in consequence Ed Farr and his brigade of wool stevedores are figuring on a busy season.—Ontario Argus.

Thomas Kearns in an interview in San Francisco says that the Salt Lake route is to build a branch from Las Vegas to tap the goldfields of Nevada. That preliminary rough surveys have already been made was told in the "News" some weeks ago.

At the meeting of the Central Pacific Railroad company held yesterday in the office of Judge Marshall, 125 south East Temple street, the old board was re-elected with the exception that the name of H. L. Miller was substituted for that of D. B. Hempstead.

Work was commenced on Saturday on the construction of the Oregon Short Line cut-off into the Ogden yards, which has been under contemplation for some time. A number of men and teams are now making the dirt fly. The work is being done by the Utah Construction company.
