Real Estate Men Meet to Urge City Council to Grant Franchises for Electric Roads.

JURORS FOR MURDER TRIAL.

Wedding Bells—A Saloon Window Smasher Arrested—County Affairs.

Ogden, Utah, April 12.—A special meeting of the Real Estate Men's association of Ogden was held yesterday afternoon in the office of Hunter & Kennedy, for the purpose of taking action expressing the views of the association on the proposed franchises for electric lines that have been before the city council. The association discussed the various phases of the ordinances for some time, and then appointed a committee to draft resolutions on the subject and present them at another special meeting. The tone of the discussion yesterday, which is expected to crystallize today into resolution, was that the association is in favor of the roads coming to Ogden. They urged on the council and other city officials to properly safeguard the interests of the city in the details of the ordinances, but are strongly in favor of interurban lines.

JURORS FOR MURDER TRIAL.

When the district court adjourned yesterday afternoon, six jurors had been selected to try the case of Joseph Kendall, charged with the murder of his wife on Sept. 15, 1904. The six men are James F. Burton, David Shippe, W. O. Ridges, Henry McIntire, David A. Shurt and George W. Bain. There was considerable difficulty in getting the jury, and two special venire were drawn during the day on the order of Judge Howell. At the beginning of the proceedings Kendall's attorneys objected to Judge Howell hearing the case for the reason that Howell was city judge at the time the murder was committed, and acted as committing judge in the case, also as coroner at the inquest over the body of Mrs. Kendall. Kendall was charged with murder in the first degree. He shot and killed his wife in a restaurant on Grant avenue, January being the cause.

FUNERAL OF SOPHIA M. JENSEN.

The remains of Mrs. Sophia Jensen, wife of Mr. Peter Jensen, were placed in the silent tomb in the Huntsville city cemetery yesterday afternoon, after impressive funeral services over her remains had been held at the ward mortuary. A large number of friends followed her remains to their last resting place, Andrew Anderson dedicated the grave.

GREY BROTHERS BACK.

Sheriff Bailey has returned from Reno, Nevada, having in custody the Grey Brothers, who were charged with the charge of grand larceny. It is alleged that he robbed a fellow countryman of over \$126. A part of the money consisted of a postoffice money order for \$25, which he sent to a friend in Salt Lake City and had him cash it and send the money here, and for that offense the federal officers may prosecute him.

FATAL FALL FROM A LADDER.

Shocking Death of Mrs. Nephie Gledhill—Mother of Nine Children.

Gunnison, Sanpete Co., April 10.—One of the saddest deaths that have occurred in our quiet little village happened on April 9, 1905, in the passing away of Mrs. Nephie Gledhill, wife of the editor and owner of the Gunnison Gazette. The day before she had occasion to use an old rickety ladder to ascend to the upper loft of her house to secure some things for her midday meal, and while descending the ladder commenced to slip sideways, and she endeavored to catch herself, but instead she fell in the opposite direction, a distance of 12 feet, lighting upon her right side. Her arm and leg were broken by the fall and she was injured internally, and died the following day. She is the mother of nine children, who survive her; was a faithful member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and had always been an active worker in the church. The funeral will take place on Tuesday, April 11, from the Relief society hall.
