cold, or shivered and trembled from the fear of an amateur, because his hands appeared to be numb and his fingers shook so badly that the coins ingers shock so badly that the coins rattled out of his grasp continually while he was trying to empty the coa-tents of the drawers. He was so im-patient that he did not think of com-pelling Neiden or Foulger to open the cash registers, but tried to do it him-self, and failing to make them work right, he smashed all of the keys. He used the register at the prescription booth, and then took the larger coins out of the register at the soda foun-tain. At the last he became so fright-ened that his knees shook and his legs almost gave way beneath him. With white face and wild eyes, he ran out of the store.

VETERINARIAN'S REPORT.

Dr. J. W. Treman Tells of Disposition Of Slaughtered Animals,

Dr. J. W. Treman, city veterinarian,

Dr. J. W. Treman, city veterinarian, submitted his report to the city coun-cil today for the month of November. It shows that there were 1,399 cattle, 2,824 sheep, 194 hogs and 84 calves butchered at the inspected slaughter houses. As a result of the inspection there were 26 animals retained, 7 sheep, 37 hogs and 2 calves, of which 2 cattle were condemned, 5 sheep, 34 hogs and 1 call. There were 623 parts of animals condemned and the bulk of the carcass allowed to go on the market.
