

## A REFORM WAVE HITS WASHINGTON

District of Columbia to be Cleaned Up Before Congress Meets in December.

WILL STAMP OUT GAMBLING.

"Bucket Shops" Unmercifully Raided—Big Poker Games Will Have Their Turn Next.

Washington, Aug. 29.—A reform wave inaugurated a few weeks ago has broken out in this city in acute form, and the local authorities have started out to clean up the District of Columbia before Congress comes back in December. Five of the leading brokers' offices, or "bucket shops," were unmercifully raided and without warning closed at noon yesterday, when the places were crowded with customers. Six more alleged bucket shops will be closed today, thus putting practically all of them in the city out of business. About three weeks ago the police began a campaign against the hand book operators. These curbstone racing gamblers have been playing their trade so openly in Washington for the past two years that the situation had become almost a national scandal because of the direct government of the District of Columbia by Congress. It was possible for a man to get a bet down in Washington at any time, and numerous cigar stores, saloons and lunch rooms were openly known as the headquarters of the hand book men, who practically made their headquarters on the open streets and took bets apparently with impunity. It is said that the next move of the District officials will be against the big poker games, which are being played in the capital's big hotels, especially when Congress is in session.

## IF BIRDS SET BROKEN LEGS, WHY NOT BROKEN WINGS?

New York, Aug. 24.—"If birds are able to set their broken legs, why do they not set their wings?" This was the comment of Frank M. Chapman, assistant curator of the department of mammalogy and ornithology of the American Museum of Natural History, when he was asked about the confirmation of Rev. William J. Long's story that birds could mend their own broken legs, which came in a cable interview with Rev. Theodore Wood, an English naturalist. "Mr. Long and his defenders cite many instances of birds setting their own legs, but they mention no birds setting broken wings," said Mr. Chapman. "Birds may live all their lives, but it is placed at a great disadvantage when it loses power of flight. It is of far greater importance for a bird to be able to set its legs than for it to repair a broken leg. Still, as every sportsman knows, the conclusion of the hunting season in the south is marked by the presence of larks numbers of crippled water fowl, which, having been wing-broken earlier in the season, are unable to return north. "Their presence in the south long after their time of migration is raised in evidence of their inability to regain the power of flight. It should not be forgotten," continued Mr. Chapman, "that Mr. Long's alleged birds setting cases deal with birds that live close to the ground. Is it reasonable to assume that the 'setting' is brought about by the cutting of the wing, the mixing of the blood from the wound with dirt and moss so that the break becomes 'set' after a fashion?" Mr. Chapman declared that he had never heard of Rev. 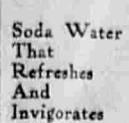

## LARGE COLLECTION OF RARE DENIZENS OF THE DEEP

New York, Aug. 29.—The steamship Bernadine, of the Quebec line, has arrived from Bermuda with a large collection of rare denizens of the deep to be added to the exhibits at the Battery aquarium. There were more than 300 specimens, and Prof. G. W. Bartleson, of the New York university, in charge of the university's station at White's Island, Bermuda, came with them. The shipment included a speckled moray four feet long, who proved a lively customer on the voyage; a cowfish, with well-developed horns; a surgeon fish, with a lance at the end of its tail; a queen trigger fish, which has two fins, one movable and the other immovable, sticking out of its back, and a jag fish, striped like a zebra. Other unique specimens are a porcupine fish that closely resembles a land porcupine, a four-eyed fish with two real eyes, located in its head, and two pairs of crinoid water fowl, which, having been wing-broken earlier in the season, are unable to return north. Pottsville, Pa., Aug. 29.—Thomas Lavelle, a prominent hotelkeeper of Girardville, near here, shot and instantly killed his sister Mary while she was sleeping early this morning. A bullet into his own head which will cause his death. It is believed that Lavelle was temporarily insane.

## ANGLO-RUSSIAN CONVENTION.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 29.—It is expected that a formal announcement of the signature of the Anglo-Russian convention will soon be made by the two governments, but the exact terms of the agreement will not be published for the present.

## PEACE IN CENTRAL AMERICA.

Washington, Aug. 29.—Ministers representing Central American republics except Guatemala called at the state department today and expressed the appreciation of their governments for the steps taken by President Roosevelt and President Diaz in negotiating for permanent peace in Central America. All the ministers predicted that the movement would be entirely successful.

## STOCKINGLESS BEAUTIES BARRED FROM BATHING.

Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 29.—"Stockingless beauties" are barred from the bathing beach by orders of the police department and Director Beckwith of the life-saving crew. At least, bold young women who affect a bathing costume without the hosiery equipment are politely informed to supply the deficiency if they wish to enjoy a dip in the surf or a trip on the strand. "This practice of refusing stockings at the bath-house, while introduced by a few careless or super-bold young women, promised to become the most annoying feature of the season. But we quickly stopped it. We are dress censors in so far as compelling bathing girls to wear hosiery, and bathing youths to avoid immediate in dress." This was the substance of a statement given out from Director Beckwith's hospital tent this afternoon. Observation by the director and prompt execution of orders by Cramer, one of the stars of the police force, have contributed much toward a well-regulated bathing beach this season. "There is less sand spitting now than ever," declares Director Beckwith.

## IDAHO WANTS CHANGE OF VENUE

In Steve Adams' Case on Ground Impossible to Get Fair Trial at Wallace.

RICHARDSON WON'T APPEAR.

Darrow in Complete Charge of Federal Cases—Hawley Telegraphed To Return at Once to Boise.

Boise, Ida., Aug. 29.—The state of Idaho will ask for a change of venue in the case of Steve Adams, charged with the murder of Fred Tyler in Shoshone county. The case will be called for trial Sept. 9 at Wallace, when a motion will be made on the ground that it is impossible to secure a fair trial at Wallace, where the population are largely miners. It is believed if a change of venue is granted the case will be sent to Moscow for trial.

It was definitely announced today that E. P. Richardson of Denver will not appear in either the trial of Adams or of Pettibone, Darrow being in complete charge. Senator Borah has telegraphed James H. Hawley, chief counsel for the prosecution in the Adams and Pettibone cases, to return to Boise at once. Hawley has been retained as counsel for Borah in the land fraud case pending in the United States district court, which convenes Sept. 9. Borah has made a demand on the government that he be served with a copy of the indictment and given an immediate trial. It is evident that either the Borah or Adams trial will have to go over until after Oct. 1, which is the date set for trial of Pettibone.

## "SIR" HARRY W. COOPER.

Notorious Criminal Will Soon Begin Fifteen Years' Term in San Quentin.

San Francisco, Aug. 29.—"Sir" Harry Westwood Cooper, known on the court records as Ernest Moore-Chadwick, will shortly begin his 15 years' imprisonment in the penitentiary at San Quentin. His appeal, which was denied by the appellate court yesterday, marks the end of a long fight before the courts. Cooper, as he is better known, is not unfamiliar with prison walls. It is said that prior to coming to California he served in other penitentiaries. Shortly after he landed in California he was arrested and convicted of fraud and served a term. While he is not prepossessing in appearance, he has an engaging way about him, and is a very capable lawyer. In prison he studied law, and during the present controversy with the courts has presented all of his own case. Cooper, after his release, forged a telegram, and on this forged message married Norine Schneider. Shortly after this marriage was annulled, two years ago, and he was in jail awaiting trial. Cooper claims he was married to a Salvation Army lassie. Cooper is a man of considerable education and always pretends to be a member of the nobility. Well read and of good appearance, he seldom failed to make an impression on those of the opposite sex. He is a very capable lawyer, and yesterday means that he will shortly begin his sentence.

## CARDINAL NETO RESIGNS.

Will Become a Humble Monk of the Carthusian Order.

Rome, Aug. 29.—Cardinal Neto, patriarch of Lisbon, has resigned his cardinalship, despite the protests of the pope, to become a humble monk of the Carthusian order. He is dean of the order of cardinal priests at the sacred college, which confers on him almost papal honors. It has been decades since any cardinal resigned his offices to become a hermit monk.

## REV. J. H. NORRIS TURNS FINANCIER AND FAILS.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 29.—Rev. John H. Norris, pastor of the Pentecostal Church at Mount Washington suburb, took a flyer in high finance, which cost him and the members of his congregation \$300,000. The members of Pastor Norris' flock until yesterday had dreams of becoming millionaires. Now they are wondering whether they are going to get any of their money back. The true state of affairs became known when Mrs. William Waters, who invested \$10,000 in Dr. Norris' enterprise, started suit to recover her money. Dr. Norris promoted a mining company and had the offices of his concern in the basement of the church. With \$300,000 obtained from the sale of stock, he bought 1,000 acres of Ohio land containing coal and fire clay. A development company was formed to exploit the land, but that venture did not succeed and the pastor formed a fire brick concern. This was no more successful and the pastor then bought

## PLAGUE IN SAN FRANCISCO.

Nine Cases and Six Deaths Since August 12.

Washington, Aug. 29.—Advice received by the surgeon-general of the public health and marine hospital service at Washington show that from Aug. 12 to today there have been nine cases of plague at San Francisco and six deaths. Two of the cases were sailors from coasting vessels. The other cases have occurred in the city and navy hospital and in other parts of the city. Instructions have been sent to all quarantine officers on the Pacific coast, to carefully inspect vessels from San Francisco and at the larger stations to fumigate.

## GERMAN ARMY SECRETS.

Coblentz, Germany, Aug. 29.—A sergeant of the Twenty-third regiment of artillery has been arrested here on the charge of treason. He was detected furnishing a traveler at Herberthal on the Belgian frontier, with copies of secret instructions regarding artillery firing as practiced in the German army, which are given only to certain officers and under stringent safeguards.

The arrested non-commissioned officer was commander of the watch and the other occupied a room at the mental headquarters, and it is presumed that he found opportunities to abstract the copies of the secret instructions from other documents. The traveler on whom the documents were found, was on his way to Paris. Further arrests are believed to be impending.
