In 1831, James Garfield was born in a humble Ohio cabin, where he was left fatherless n his infancy. It is common talk in the ment of affairs of insolvent National Banks. It is common talk in the Freesury Department that there has been a great deal of money need-lessly spent in "the winding up of these banks, and that certain indi-viduals have profited largely at the expense of depositors and stock holders. If the figures should be ascertained, it would be found that iarge sums of money have been paid to receivers of these banks in the way of compensation, and that cer-tain lawyers and ex-Congressmen now practic ng in Washington have also been paid fat-fees for alleged legal services in winding up banks, instead of the service being required of some of the law officers of the Government, whose time and service are paid for to look after its interests.
