Nashville, Nov. 13-The grand jury of Davidson county today returned a true bill in which Col. Duncan E.

Cooper, his son, Robin Cooper, and ex-Sheriff John D. Sharp are jointly charged with the murder of ex-Senacharged with the murder of externa-tor E. W. Carmack and in which Sharp is also indicted on the charge of being an accessory before the fact. The names of six witnesses appear on the back of the indictment, as foliows: Mrs. Cobey R. Carmack, Mrs. Charles Eastman, Carey Folk, Dr. James Wittenberg, Mrs. Martha Morgan and Miss, Mary Skeffington. The Mrs. Carmack in the list is the widow of the former senator. It was E. W. Dr. Wittenberg runs an optical establishment in the west end of the Arcade through which the Coppers, accompanied by Sharp, are alleged to have passed shortly be-fore the tragedy occured.
