## TO SUPPRESS THE WILD ANIMALS THE TABERNACLE

Elder Charles W. Penrose Makes a Bounties on Mountain Lions and Other Savage Beasts.

FLAGRANT DEPREDATIONS.

Serious Inroads Into the Profits of The Stochmen to be thecked by Strong Arm of the State,

That the wild animals and lesser vermin have become a great source of annoyance to the owners of flocks and herds in some sections of the state is clearly evident from the number of bills that were introduced during the last Legislature looking to the destruction of these animals. No small amount of time was consumed during the session, by a recital of how these pests harrass the sheep and cattle until their depredations have become so flagrant that they must be checked by the strong arm of the state. The latter therefore was invoked, and is extended in the following law, which provides a bounty on mountain tions and other large animals that roam wild. It is large animals that from which it quite probable that the people living in the cities had no idea there were a half dozen mountain lions in the entire state, but they are here, and in such abundant numbers, according to the representations made while this and other similar acts were being discussed, ther similar acts were being discussed that they are making material inroads into the profits of the sheep and cattle dealer. This is the full text of the law: Chapter 48. Bountles for the destruction of certain wild animals.

An act to amend sections 1, 2, 4, 5 6 and 9 of chapter 137, of the laws of Utah of 1901, to encourage the destruc-tion of certain wild animals, and pro-ciding bounty for the killing of the and penalties for violations

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Utah: Section 1. That sections 1, 2, 4, 5, 6

and 9 of chapter 137, of the laws of Utah, of 1991, be and the same are hereby amended to read as follows; Sec. 1. There shall be paid as hereinafter provided for the killing within the boundaries of this state, of animals

ereinafter named, the following bounies, to-wit: For each coyote, so killed ne dollar and a half, lynx, or wild cat so killed, one dollar, for each wolf other than coyote, and for each mountain lion or bear so killed, five dollars. Sec. 2. Any person killing within this state, after the passage of this act, one or more of the above named animals, and who shall desire to claim the bounty therefor, shall, within 60 days from the date of the killing thereof, exhibit the scalp with the ears entire and tall connected of such animal to the clerk of any county within this state, and shall at the same time file with the said county clerk his affidavit in writing taken before him as such clerk, which affidavit shall be substantially in the form following, to-wit: I do solemnly swear that the skin or the scale with the ears entire and tail connected, by

an animal by me killed in this the State of Utah within 60 days prior to the date of this affidavit.
Sec. 4 If, upon filing the affidavit required in section 2, it shall appear to the satisfaction of said clerk that such animal was killed in this state, and that the scalp with ears entire and tall connected have not been covered, attached the State of Utah substantially in the

No fee shall be charaged by the Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the county clerk of each and every county of this state wherein said skins of neted are presented or parts of skins together with the date of their re-cipt, and the name of the person de-livering the same, and said book shall expiration of his term of office. Upor the same in his office, and he shall give the person presenting such certificate a warrant on the state treasurer for the amount specified in accordance with lew; provided, that said certificates may be properly assigned and present-ed to the treasurer of any county with-in the state, whose duty it shall be to pay said certificates upon presenta-tion, out of the general fund of the county, and transmit them to the state analter for payment by the state, as often as he may deem necessary.
