URBANE BANDITS BOARD STREETCAR

After Robbing Conductor Richins, They Pass Cigars to the Crew and Depart.

FIVE PASSENGERS SEE WORK.

When They Move About, One of the Bold Pair Fires His Revolver Into Air and Warns the Bystanders.

Emboldened to a point of recklessness by the failure of the police as directed by Chief of Police Barlow and Chief of Detectives George Sheets to capture the numerous highwaymen and burglars who have worked openly throughout Salt Lake City, two masked men deliberately boarded a Wandamere car at the end of that line, and held up the motorman and conductor, robbing the latter of \$24.50, while five passengers who had just quit the car stood by and looked on at the daring trick, shortly after midnight this morning.

The holdups, according to Metzner and Conductor Richins, brothers, considered the whole affair as a joke, as they laughed and chatted lightly.

"Well, I suppose we might as well emulate the 'gentleman holdup,' as they call him," said one of the robbers, taking two fine diamonds of delicate work out of his cigar case and handing one to the conductor and the other to the motorman.

"What's your name?" asked the other holdup with a dry chuckle, "but tell 'em that it won't do 'em any good to gun-shoe us, because we wear our shoes backwards, and then change 'em frontwards every other block, so that even Sherlock Holmes couldn't tell whether we were going home or to church."

At this juncture, two of the passengers who had just alighted from the car and had been standing supinely by watching the performance, moved over through the aisle and took a seat back on the bench. "None of that boys," said one of the robbers, pulling a gun and driving the affrighted outsiders away. The holdup pointed the revolver above his head and fired three shots in rapid succession. The five men on the corner waited for no other hints, and promptly took to their heels in various directions.

"Don't get nervous, boys. We don't want to hurt anybody. All we want is the coin," said one hold-up.

"Yes, just smoke up. You'll find the good cigars," said the other hold-up.

Conductor Richins stated that \$20 of the money secured by the robbers belonged to the company, while \$4.50 of it was his own. The hold-ups did not attempt to take any money from the motorman.

The carmen immediately notified the police, but no captures were made, as usual. The hold-ups, according to their victims, wore brown suits and had red handkerchiefs tied around their faces. They wore black slouch hats, drawn down over their eyes. The hold-up who held the gun is said to have had blood on the back of one of his hands.
