## HARRIMAN'S LATEST MERGER

Plans for Consolidation of Big Ex press Companies.

J. E. DOOLY ON THE SUBJECT

Says Stock is in Hands of the Dear Public and Would be Hard To Get Control.

According to an Associated Press dispatch the San Francisco Call this morning intimates that the four big express companies of the countrythe Adams, American, United States and Wells-Fargo may be merged into one corporation. It says that word comes by private message from the east that E. H. Harriman, president of the Southern Pacific company, will be elected to the presidency of the Wells-Fargo Express company at the next annual meeting of the stockhold ers. The paper adds that Harriman may be selected as president of the proposed combination

When seen this morning John E. Dooly, cashier of Wells-Fargo's bank was inclined to the idea that such a combination would be extremely difficuit under existing circumstances, although, he said, there had been rumors to the above effect for nearly a

"As to the Wells-Fargo express," he said, "the Southern Pacific, of which Mr. Hariman is president, controls and owns \$1,350,000 of the capital stock and owns \$1,350,000 of the capital stock of \$8,000,000 of the Wells-Fargo comppany, or about 17 per cent. The balance of the stock is held in small bunches by the dear public. The stock of this corporation for the last six months has paid dividends at the rate of 8 per cent per annum, and there is very little of the stock in the market. While it is ostensibly quoted at \$150 to \$200 per stare about the biggest deal I have heard of in connection with the express company was one block of the express company was one block of stock which was bought recently con-sisting of 500 shares at \$225 a share. Continuing, he said: "It is understood that the stock of all the express com-panies mentioned in the dispatch is scattered in much the same way with the exception of the United States company which is controlled by Senator Platt of New York and the Pacific Express company in which George J. Gould holds the balance of power. The stocks of the express companies are generally held as investments and are scattered throughout the United States possibly to a greater extent than any other stocks on the market today. About the only way possible toeffect a consolidation of the companles would be to purchase a con-rolling interest in the stocks of the various companies, and this in my opin-ion will take considerable time."


