NEW YORK, 20.—*Truth* says: The Queen, for two months, has been in a state of mild melancholy which in the course of time, if not relieved, will probably become very difficult to treat. Her condition has naturally caused great anxiety because of the tendencies of her family. Her Majesty and Princess Beatrice will, in the autumn, go to the vicinity of Florence, Italy, where they will remain two months.

ST. LOUIS, 20.—The Williamson and Stewart Paper Co. made an assignment to J. P. Whyte; assets \$162,000, subject to a deed of trust for nearly \$100,000.

PRINCETOWN, Mass., 20.—Mate Dunham and six or eight of the crew of the whaling schooner *Ellen Beepal* were lost on a whaling voyage. The Captain and Mate struck a whale at the same time, and the Mate's line becoming fouled, his boat was dragged under and never seen afterwards.

WASHINGTON, 20.—General Sherman accompanied by Tidball of his staff, left here this morning for Buffalo, where he will be joined by Chief Justice Waite and Justice Gray. From there the party will start on their trip across the continent, along the northern boundary of the United States, for the inspection of all of the military posts en route. Gen. Sherman would have postponed his departure until after the funeral of Gen. Ewing, but one day's delay in starting would have disarranged all his plans throughout the entire trip, which has been carefully mapped out, with dates for arrival at certain points, and escorts provided to meet the party along the route.

Chicago, 20.—Sixteen of the noted oarsmen of the country have already arrived to take part in the regatta at Pulman on Friday and Saturday of this week. They comprise the finest field of rowers ever assembled in the United States for such a contest. Haulon, the world's champion, will contest in both single and double races. His companion in the double scull race being Lee. Haulon is in fine condition, but it is asserted that he will have to row to hold the first place, as some of the fifteen are known to be in most excellent shape and are liable to press him. Oarsmen describe the Lake Calumet course as one of the finest, and with good weather, there is promise of an enormous attendance, as it is really the first great professional race which has ever occurred in the west. The railway companies are preparing to accommodate the large crowds of people attending from this city.

NEW LONDON, 20.—The four mile straight away, eight-oared race between Harvard and Columbia, was rowed this morning. Harvard winning by 12 lengths. The wind freshened considerably before the start, making a bad choppy sea. Harvard had the west and Columbia the east of the course. Harvard though plashing a trifle got the best start and at no time was she headed. At the two mile flag the time was 3.05 with at least three lengths between them. Columbia at this point being twenty seconds behind, the race was virtually over. Here Harvard gradually increased her lead, Columbia showing visible signs of being used up. At the 2 1/2 mile flag Harvard led by four lengths, pulling 34 strokes to the Columbia's 32. At the 3 mile flag Harvard had a lead of five lengths, which was increased at the 3 1/2 mile by seven lengths. Here Harvard made a fine spurt and crossed the line pulling 34 strokes and winning the race by 12 lengths in 24 minutes and 55 seconds. The Columbia's time was 25.55. Harvard pulled in splendid form from the start to the finish.

The attendance outside the colleges was noticeably small. Before the race bets ranging from 100 to 60 to even money were made on the Columbias.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 19.—The steamer *Sophia*, with Prof. Nordenskjold and his Arctic exploring expedition, arrived at Reykjavik, Iceland, June 6th. The party intended to start for Greenland on the 10th.

Sunderland, 19.—The number of deaths from the catastrophe at Victoria Hall now reach 202.

Paris, 19.—At a meeting of 1,800 Socialists in Montmartre, last night, a resolution was passed demanding the revision of the constitution.

La Liberte says: Negotiations between France and England in relation to the abolition of capitulations in Tunis have had a satisfactory result. England agreeing to give up the right of asylum in her consulate.

St. Petersburg, 19.—A Ukase has been issued re-establishing the prefecture of St. Petersburg, in the main as it was previous to August, 1881.

London, 19.—The secretary of the committee to place the bust of Longfellow in Westminster presented the American committee with 500 letters from persons of note, who subscribed, to be kept in some public institution in New England as a testimonial of the high esteem in which the poet was held by the best minds in Great Britain.

LONDON, 19.—In the chess tournament to-day, Steinitz beat Mason, thereby securing the second prize; McKenzie and Engleish played a drawn game.

With reference to Admiral Plerre's dispatch announcing the capture of Tamatave the Malagasy envoys state that the demands of the French were preposterous; they knew their ultimatum would be rejected. The Queen of Madagascar gave stringent orders not to return the French flag. She recalled most of her troops to the capital, and only 200 remained at Tamatave to maintain order. Tamatave is defended by merely one mud fort, mounting four old muzzle-loading guns. The Queen is now shut off from foreign powers. It will take the French at least five months to march to the capital, and there is sufficient food in the capital to stand a siege of several months. The Hovas have there over 6,000 disciplined troops, most of whom are armed with Remington rifles. The nation will fight to the bitter end. Meanwhile it is hoped the powers will intervene. The envoys regard the bombardment of Tamatave as a wanton and cruel act. They fear many foreign residents of Tamatave were killed.

The Commons, 286 to 16, rejected the motion of Taylor, member from Leicester, against compulsory vaccination.

A dispatch from Mataram, Java, states that the Dutch schooner ashore at Pratt Island was boarded by Chinese fishermen who robbed the vessel of all valuables and threatened the crew with spears and daggers. One boat reached Hong Kong for assistance, and the British gunboat *Swift* has been ordered to the scene.

Sunderland, 19.—The funeral of a great many victims of Saturday's disaster took place to-day. The streets were crowded with sympathetic people, most of whom were in mourning. One hundred free graves were prepared in one cemetery for the reception of the victims, exclusive of those for which the parents of children who lost their lives will pay. Fifty-four bodies were interred in this cemetery to-day, and thirty-one in a smaller cemetery. Large numbers of generous subscriptions are arriving in Sunderland from different parts to help pay the funeral expenses of the unfortunate children.

Paris, 19.—Admiral Plerre in a dispatch from Tamatave, Madagascar, dated June 18th, announces that he presented his ultimatum to the Hova Government, which rejected it. He then captured Tamatave and destroyed Toul Point, Motambo and Trenive. The French, he says, are firmly established in these positions, without suffering any loss of men. The principal operations are finished, and a state of siege proclaimed.

Three thousand five hundred French troops, 1,000 Anamite auxiliaries, besides landing parties from the French squadron, will arrive in Tonquin within a fortnight. The Malagasy Envoys had an interview with Prime Minister

Ferry on Saturday before news of the capture of Tamatave had been received. It is thought all further negotiations will now be left in the hands of Admiral Plerre and the French agent in Madagascar.

The Chinese ambassador will have an interview with Prime Minister Ferry to-day.

Lyons, 19.—A fire broke out in the wood stores this evening, and soon covered two acres. Forty railway cars are burned. Trains in the service between Lyons and Geneva are interfered with.

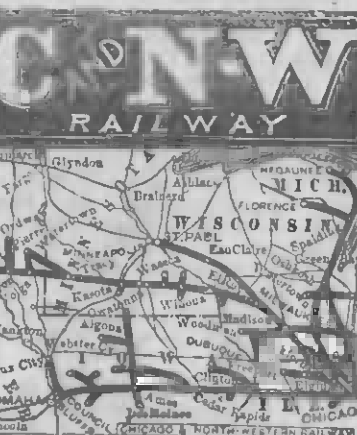
