## Threatens to Go to Court Unless

Council Rescinds Action.

The board of public works has taken umbrage at the action of the city coun-cil in athuorizing City Engineer Kelsey to cil in athuorizing City Engineer Keisey to construct a concrete conduit at the point where Mill creek crosses the Jordan and Salt Lake canal. At a meet-of the council Jan. 18, the condition of the crossing was brought to the attention of the council, and the engineer was instructed to go ahead with the work. He estimated the cost at \$5.08.45, but the bids subsequently received were nearly \$2.000 in excess of that amount. nearly \$2,000 in excess of that amount.

The board of public works claims that the council acted unlawfully in ordering the work done otherwise than through the board, and cites the statutes in support of their contention. City attorney Dining stands with the board and says that if the council does not reseind its action the matter will be carried into the courts.

Mayor Braugford favored the action

seind its action the matter will be carried into the courts.

Mayor Bransford favored the action of the council and maintains that inasmuch as it was an emergency case the council had the right to have the work done by the engineer. He said that it was necessary that the conduit be in working order by April I, and that if the project were executed by the board of public works it would require 29 days time to advertise.

The army officers are holding the man until the arrival of the mar-shal and assistant district attorney, when he will be formally arrested and taken before the United States commissioner, for preliminary hearing, further developments have been ported here as yet, but it is certain the government will not cease its efforts until each of the thieves is captured or run out of the country.
