County Court.

A FEARFUL FATALITY.

Thomas Yardley Horribly Crushed Beneath the Wheels of a Street Car.

DETAILS OF THE SAD AFFAIR.

Sam Griffith Hurt, Though Not Seriously.—The Date of the Funeral Not Yet Fixed.

A most lamentable accident occurred on the Rapid Transit Street Car line directly opposite the north gates of the Temple Block, a few minutes after 4 o'clock this morning. As car No. 25, which runs between the Union Pacific depot and Murray, was proceeding westward near the point where the casualty happened, the blind tracks were suddenly switched off on the side track by the switch bar being jacked loose.

The passengers, of whom there were about a dozen on board, became greatly excited, made a rush for the platform and commenced jumping off. The car continued to proceed and the car stopped after it had run down the street on both tracks for about five rods.

Among the passengers who leaped from the car was Thomas Yardley, a young man about seventeen years of age, employed by the Union Pacific as a mail carrier. It was estimated that he was unable to jump across the side track down which the blind tracks were running parallel with the main track. As he made the attempt he slipped and fell beneath the wheels and was horribly crushed, though he was not killed.

After the car had passed over him he was picked up and carried to the Deseret Hospital, where he was treated by Dr. Howard, Hascall and Irving. On examination it was determined that the right leg was badly broken, while the left leg was crushed and mangled into a shapeless and mangled mass. The right leg was completely severed, and there were numerous other injuries, both internal and external. The doctors administered an anesthetic and decided to wait a reasonable time before performing any operation.

Shortly after 12 o'clock Dr. Howard stated the most that could be done for the lad was to relieve him of his pain by means of the use of morphine. At that time he was surrounded by his parents and relatives, who were sorrowfully weeping and weeping.

While the lad was being carried to the Parkside addition near the corner of Ninth and East and Twelfth streets. His father is a native of the city and was a member of the city of the Pacific telegraph company.

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Fires Extinguished.

Of the Third District Court Opened by Chief Justice Zane Today.

The money stolen from Mr. Wood was still, he said, in the hands of the court, and as Kenda's conviction was, on appeal, was affirmed by the Territorial Supreme Court, counsel asked for an order of the court making over the money to the lawful owner. Judge Zane asked whether any action had been made for a refund, and Mr. Stephens said that he was aware of it. Judge Zane thought the assistant district attorney had better inquire as to that, and the matter was therefore ordered to stand over for the present.

This is the first term of court held in the new County building.

Criminal business will begin in the Third District Court on the 25th inst. District "Don" Zenger, after a short absence, returned to his old post in the Third District Court this morning, and at 10:15, in obedience to the command of Chief Justice Zane, declared the September term of court open.

There are sixty-two criminal cases on the calendar for the coming term, and the grand jurors were required to be on hand at 10 o'clock this morning. Chief Justice Zane, upon taking his seat, immediately named the grand jurors.

The grand jurors were then called. Several of the gentlemen mentioned were excused on account of sickness. Those called were examined by Assistant District Attorney Stephens as to their fitness to serve. As only a few of these mentioned, however, were present, all were excused till 2 p.m.

Mr. Ford, a petit juror, asked, to be excused from further attendance. He said that he had completed a term of service in the Territorial Supreme Court, and as he was now on his way to the Territory, he was unable to attend.
