Thirst Quenched Without Drinking.

It may not be generally know to our readers that water, even salt water; im-bibed through the skin appeases thirst alm at as well as fresh water taken in-wardly. In illustration of this subject; a correspondent has sent us the followa correspondent has sent us the following abridged quotation from a "Narrative of Captain Kennedy's Losing His Vessel, and His Distresses afterward" which was noticed in Dodsly's Annual Register for 1868: "I cannot conclude without making mention of the great advantage I seceived from scaking my ciothes twice a day in Salt water, and putting them on without ringing.
