Waterworks at Soda Springs.

David James & Co., of this city, are putting in a system of waterworks at Soda Springs, Idaho, for the Natural Mineral Water Company and the Union Pacific. The supply of water is obtained from a short distance above the Hooper Spring, and is cold and clear as crystal, and for quality cannot be surpassed. This water is to be conveyed two miles to the town, in four-inch mains, and will be distributed to the Idaho, Horsley and Williams hotels, and to several private residences. The cost of the present improvements will reach about \$6,000.

Arrested and Discharged.

On Tuesday President Canute Peterson, of Saupete Stake, was arrested at Ephraim on the charge of unlawful cohabitation. He was wanted before the Commissioner at Spring City, but being too ill to make the trip the examination was postponed one day. On Saturday, after a hearing before Commissioner Johnson, he was discharged.

Arrested at St. George.

On Saturday evening Deputies Armstrong and McGarry, who had been around St. George for a couple of days, arrested John E. Pace, superintendent of the St. George Co-operative store, on a charge of living with more than one wife. The accused started for Beaver on Sunday morning, in company with the deputies, to have a hearing before the commissioner. His wife and child were also taken.

Affected Him Badly.

During last Wednesday night Wm. Goodwin, Jr., of this city, was seized with a fit of somnambulism and took a nocturnal walk. He had been reading an account of the Salt Lake fire and dreamed that his room was in flames. He climbed out of a second story window and fell to the ground. It turned out most seriously for upon being discovered and awakened he was found to be very severely bruised and injured, one of his legs being broken. months—on February last, by Judge Zane. At the conclusion of the examination, the commissioner ordered that he be released from imprisonment, which was done.

DEATH OF HON. F. LITTLE

A Prominent and Wealthy Citizen Passes Away.

At 4:23 a. m. yesterday, Hon. Feramorz Little died at his residence. This announcement will be so unexpected as to almost startle a large portion of the public of this Territory, as it has been but a few days since the news that he was ill began to be circulated, and it is not a fortnight since he was moving about in apparent health.

Deceased was born in Aurelius Cayuga County, New York, June 14th, 1830, and hence was aged fifty-seven years and two months. He was the son of James and Susan (Young) Little. His father was a native of Ireland and his mother was a sister to the late President Brigham Young. His father was killed by an accident when he was only four years old, after which event his mother removed to Mendon, Monroe County, N. Y., with her children, four in all. His mother married, after a time, William B. Stillson, and in 1823 removed from Mendon to Springwater Valley, Livingston County, and in the spring
