DEATH OF HON. F. LITTLE

A Prominent and Wealthy Citizen Passes Away,

At 4:23 a.m. yesterday, Hon Feramorz Little died at his residence. This announcement will be so anexpected as to almost startle a large portion of the public of this Territory, as it has been but a few days since the news that he was ill began to be circulated, and it is not a fortnight since he was moving

was ill began to be circulated, and it is not a forthight since he was moving about in apparent health.

Deceased was born in, Aurelius Cayuga County, New York, Jane 1sth, 1830, and hence was a ged fifty-seven years and two months. He was the son of James and Susan (Young) Little. His father was a native of Ireland and his mother was a slater to the late President Brigham Young. His father was killed by an accident when ne was only four years old, after which event his mother removed to Mendon, Monroe County, N. Y., with her children, four it all. His mother married, after a time, William B. Stilson, and in 1823 removed from Mendon to Springwater Valley, Livingston County, and in the spring of 1829 Feramorz, at his own desire, became the immute of the household of a Mr. Chamberlain. In 1832 his mother, with her brothers Brigham and Joseph, hecame a Latterday-Saint, and in the following year, gathered with the Saints at Kirtland. Feramoz, however, remained with Mr. Chamberlain, and was separated from his family for twelve years, visiting these twelve years he had gone from New York State to St. Louis, reaching bis family for twelve years, visiting them again in Nauvoo ia 1844. During them again in Nauvoo ia 1844. During these twelve years he had gone from New York State to St. Louis, reaching the latter place in 1845. He soon eagaged in mercantile business. While on a visit to Nauvoo he was married February 12th, 1846, to LFaunie M. Decker, his uncle Brighau periorming the ceremony. Shortly after his marriage he returned to St. Louis accompanied by his Bride, and remained there unto 1850. In that year he formed a plan to go to California, and intenped to stop on the way to visit his frieuds in Utah. Its arrived in Salt Lake Valley, bringing with him a train of merchadise for Liviagston & Kinkead, but instead of going on to California, remained in Utah. In 1853 he was baptized.

Foramorz Little was one of the first contractors to carry the mails "across the plains." His first centract of this kind was taken in 1850, and for many years he continued a connection with the mail service. He has been identified with numerous and important business enterprises in this Territory. In 1854-5 he superintended the construction of a wagon road and five saw mills in Big Cottonwood caffou, for a company, and afterwards engaged extensively in the manufacture of

a company, and afterwards engaged extensively in the manufacture of lumber. In 1803, as Church emigration agent, he superintended the fitting out at Florence, Nebraska, of few wagons and 4,000 Saints. In 1868 9 he was a contractor on the Union Pacific Railroad, and subsequently become Railroad, and subsequently became one of the chief promoters of the ULAN Central. He was a director of the latter road at the time of his death, and was at one time its superintend-

He was one of the founders of the Deseret National Bank and one of its directors at the time of his death. He

directors at the time of his death. He was a born financier and was pussessed of remarkable ability in that direction. In various parts of the Territory, and in connection with many business cuterprises, the fruits of his talent in this regard are seen.

Of his social qualities it may be said that he was cultured, genial and urbane. He kept himself well informed and was public spirited in a great device. He was charitable to an extreme, and never falled, on appropriate occasions, to testify in a substantial manner of his sympathy for the poor. His generosity in this regard will redound to his eternal praise. He built a block of tenement rooms in the rear of the Thurteenth Ward Assembly Hooms, for the permanent use and benefit of the poor of that Ward, and his minor acts of charity and benevolence are unnumbered.

ity and benevolence are unnumbered.

He held the office of counselor to Bishop E.D. Woolley of the Thirteenth Ward at the time of and for several years prior to the latter's death, and while pursuing that calling was specially watchful of the needs of the party.

In 1874 he was elected a member of the City Council, and in 1876, Mayor of Sailt Lake City, holding the latter ofthe three terms. In this position he displayed excellent administrative ability

ability.

The malady which caused death was of a typhoid character, and owing to the effect it had upon the remains in hastening decomposition, it was thought beat to hold the funeral services this afternoon at a o'clock. It was understood that the City Council would, in a body, attend the services, which were to be held at the late residence of the decessed. Flags over the dence of the deceased.
