

PROF. STARR TURNS PROPHET OF EVIL

Chicago University Savant
Predicts Roosevelt Will Not Return
To the United States Alive.

IF HE CARRIES OUT HIS PLANS.

Bases His Prediction on the Fevers of
Africa and Not on Foreboding of
Wild Animals He'll Meet.

Chicago, March 6.—Theodore Roosevelt will never return to the United States alive if he carries out his announced intention in exploring the dark regions of Africa in quest of big game.

This is the opinion of Prof. Frederick Starr of the University of Chicago, whose prophecy is based on his knowledge of the dangers of that country, particularly the insidious fevers, gained through his expeditions to the Congo Free State.

The ex-president, according to the educator, will invade a section of the country where few white men have dared to venture heretofore on account of the fatal nature of prevailing epidemics and the "sleeping sickness."

"His danger," says the professor, in a communication to students, "will not lie in the ferociousness of the animals which dwell there, but in the fevers the explorers have come to fear and which have taken the lives of many. I have visited Africa and have known the extent of these. I had a fever peculiar to that portion of the country I visited nine different times and narrowly escaped with my life."

The ex-president has not the temperament that a man needs who would withstand the dangers of the climate.

TO OCCUPY IMPERIAL SUITE.

New York, March 6.—When ex-President Roosevelt leaves New York, on March 23, on the steamship Hamburg, he will have the distinction of occupying the Imperial suite which was used by the German emperor when he went to the Mediterranean during the winter of 1905-6. The Hamburg is due to arrive at Naples on April 1, when the first leg of Mr. Roosevelt's journey will be finished.

The Imperial suite is situated on the upper promenade deck, on the starboard side of the liner and includes a parlor, two bedrooms and two bath rooms. The rooms are very quickly furnished.

Although on shipboard, the ex-president will not lack means of taking vigorous exercise, for the Hamburg has a well equipped gymnasium with an electric "horse" and a rough riding "canoe." Any degree of jolting may be obtained by the manipulation of the devices and Mr. Roosevelt if he wishes, may repeat his famous 90 mile ride while about 1,000 miles out at sea.

INFORMAL BREAKFAST TO EX-PEST. ROOSEVELT

New York, March 6.—Theodore Roosevelt, ex-president of the United States, will be the principal guest at an informal breakfast at the home of Robert J. Collier, in Park avenue, this city, on Saturday morning, next. Thirty others will be present and they are men prominently identified with magazine work. Among the more prominent guests beside Mr. Roosevelt will be William Dean Howells, Dr. Albert Shaw, Richard Watson Glaser, Walter H. Page and the Rev. Father John J. Wynne, editor of the New Catholic Review of America. Other guests who have no connection with the press will be Maj. Gen. Wood, Mr. Newberry, until recently secretary of the navy, and Clarence H. Mackay.

HIGHEST EFFICIENCY TARGET PRACTISE

Washington, March 6.—One of the highest figures of efficiency ever made in target practise has been reached by the Eighty-fifth company, coast artillery corps at Fort Casey, Wash., according to a statement given out by the war department. This company made

100 per cent of hits at a 30 by 60-foot target going at the rate of 6.5 miles an hour at a mean range of 6,450 yards. The practise was held at a battery of 10-inch rifles mounted on disappearing carriages. The series of four ten-round shots was fired from two guns in the total elapsed time of 2 minutes and 28 seconds.

As showing the company's general efficiency, the department states that the company has made nine out of ten second shots fired this year at a moving target and only one other company assigned to 10-inch rifles has made a higher score. The chief of coast artillery is gratified over this excellent record and has recommended that Maj. Andrew Hays, Jr., who commanded the company in practise and the officers and men of the company, be commended.

"SHOT TO PIECES."

Chicago Judge Decides Its a Good Term to Apply to Automobiles.
Chicago, March 6.—After hearing considerable argument by counsel, Municipal Judge Crowe has decided that "shot to pieces" as applied to some automobiles, is a perfectly good term. In a suit before him yesterday a salesman testified that a certain automobile was "all shot to pieces," because it entered a warehouse. "I object to that term," said an attorney, and then came the prolonged discussion. "Is that term, 'shot to pieces,' used by automobile men?" Judge Crowe asked. "Yes, it is a common expression."

"If that is so, I will have to admit the phrase into the evidence," ruled the court, "although the term is not exactly a good one from a legal standpoint."

A LUCKY MAN.

While Digging in Potato Patch Dug Up A Tin Box of Gold.

San Francisco, March 6.—A special from Portland states that Richard Cornett unearthed \$2,000 in gold dust and nuggets while he was spading in his potato patch near that city. The treasure, which was in a rusty tin box, is supposed to have been buried by an old Australian miner, who died in a cabin on the property over 30 years ago. After the box had been found it was discovered that the place had been marked by 22 spikes driven in a log nearby. They were in a row pointing toward the treasure, which was just 22 feet away. The old miner had confided to his neighbors that he was rich, but no one believed him. Now that the treasure has been uncovered hundreds of the residents are searching for more.

TALK OF WAR WITH JAPAN IS ALL BUNCOMBE

Colorado Springs, Colo., March 6.—"As far as any war between the United States and Japan is concerned, all such talk is buncome," declared Rear Admiral Robley D. Evans, who arrived here this afternoon, in an interview.

"The Japanese have their hands full in taking care of the Russian situation. It is rebuilding its navy, getting its army into shape and constructing a double-track railroad across Siberia. Russia will not be satisfied until it has another try in the field with Japan."

Admiral Evans scouts the idea that the school controversy in California will lead to war with Japan. "You might as well talk about an attack on a Chinese laundry causing war with that nation," said he. "Why should Japan seek war with the United States? Japan certainly has no right to interfere in the state's regulation of its schools."

"Of course, the terms of our treaty with Japan should be observed. Roosevelt handled that feature excellently. I don't believe the possibility of war has been given serious consideration by either country."

The entire agitation, he said, was by the phantasies of both countries.
