THE "LIBERAL" CLAIM.

Bulletins of returns issued by the "Liberal" committee claim that at 12 noon the vote stood:

- First Precinct—People 338, Liberal 211.
- Second Precinct—People 504, Liberal 387.
- Third Precinct—People 107, Liberal 117.
- Fourth Precinct—People 299, Liberal 101.
- Fifth Precinct—People 351, Liberal 293.

Their bulletin for 2 p. m. was as follows:

- The First Precinct showed the People 17 ahead.
- Second Precinct — People 592, Liberal 468.
- Third Precinct—People 493, Liberal 147.
- Fourth Precinct — People 355, Liberal 126.

THE PEOPLE'S CLAIM

does not differ greatly from the foregoing, except in the First Precinct, where they place the majority for Le Grand Young, the People's nominee, at 123 at 3:30. It is apparent that the People's Party has held its own all along the line, and that those who sought consolation in the hope that there were some who would turn from the party of good government to the "Liberal" ranks are sadly disappointed.

THE CITY'S FIGURES.

On the whole showing made thus far the total city vote up to this afternoon is just under 3700. This is divided about as follows: People 2150; "Liberal" 1540.

AT OGDEN.

OGDEN, August 5th, 1889. [Special to the News.]—At 4 o'clock the total vote polled was 1467. Everything was quiet at that hour. Two arrests have been made at the instance of the People's Party, for illegal voting. The People's Party are strongly hopeful.

The following appeared in the EVENING NEWS of Tuesday, Aug. 6:

The election is over. Its result is not other than was anticipated by the People's Party, except in the First Precinct of this city, where it was believed that LeGrand Young would be elected by from 15 to 20 majority. This was changed, however, by about 35 of those who have heretofore been ostensibly connected with the People's Party going over to the enemy. It is a good thing to note, however, that this class is few in numbers, as is shown by the result in all the other precincts.

Thirty-nine soldiers from Fort Douglas voted yesterday, who cannot vote at a city election, and this leaves the city vote as shown by the election to be a tie.

THE "LIBERAL" PANDEMONIUM.

Last night a considerable crowd, mostly "Liberals," were gathered on the streets, awaiting the count of the votes. The saloons were thrown open and liberally patronized, as was evidenced by the effects exhibited on the patrons. When the announcement of the result in the Fifth precinct was made, the yelling began, and the crowd surged around the "Liberal" headquarters. Then came the statement that the "Liberals" had carried the Second precinct. This was greeted with wild cheers, and when the further announcement was made that Frank Pierce had been elected in the First precinct, the crowd seemed filled with demoniacal glee. Speeches were made by Judge Powers, C. E. Allen, Theodore Burmester, C. S. Varian, ex-Gov. West, and others. Some of the expressions made both by several of the speakers and by the crowd, evinced an intense hostility to the "Mormon" people. It was stated that the "Liberals" had carried the city by about 100, and this was the keynote for a fresh outburst of frightful yells, oaths and hideous noises. The crowd fairly went wild. Bonfires were lighted, rockets, squibs and bombs fired, and everything that exultant madmen could do to vent their feelings by their voice was indulged in. Along the principal streets, carriage steps were torn up and carried into the streets, sign boards, bill boards, and everything that was loose gathered and thrown on the fires which were lighted. Some people wanted to begin burning buildings, but this element did not find a field in which to operate, as the police exerted every endeavor to protect property, and while they could not protect the small articles that were in the streets, they did succeed in preserving the buildings. The scene was such as this city has never before witnessed.

AT OGDEN

the voting was lively during the whole day. The "Liberals" had confidently declared that they would carry Weber County, but in this they were disappointed, Hon. C. C. Richards being chosen for the Council by a majority of about 350. The whole county ticket was elected by the people. Ogden was carried
