District Court-Weber Stake Academy Opening-Salt Lake Opera Co,-Y. L. M. I. A. Social.

One of the largest attended and most impressive funerals that has ever been held in Ogden City took place yesterday over the hemains of Hon. David H. Peery, During Thursday afternoon and yesterday morning the remains lay in state in the Peery mansion. They reposed in a solid pollshed oak casket, and during the time that the remains could be viewed a continuous throng of friends entered the partor to look for the last time in mortality on the face of one of Ogden's most influential citizens and a true friend to the rich and the poor, and many eyes were damp-ened with grief, and none could leave without expressing their feelings of love for the noble dead.

The home was closed to the public at noon, and the remains were left to the view of the family until about 1:30 p m., when the home was reopened and in a few minutes the spacious halls, rooms and apartments of the lower floor f the home were filled to overflowing with sympathizing friends and many had to remain outside on the lawn, who gathered to show a tribute of respect to the departed. The front parlor was reserved for the family of the deceased and the immediate relations, who entered a few minutes before 2 o'clock p. m.

The singers occupied the music room

at the rear of the parlor. Promptly at 2 o'clock Bishop Robert McQuarrie, who presided over the ser-vices, announced the opening hymn, "Thou art our everlasting Friend," which was beautifully rendered by the Second ward choir. The opening prayer was pronounced by Elder Joseph Hall. The choir sang sweetly, "Nearer, my God, to Thee."

The life of William McKinley is the severest condemnation that can be uttered against the methods of the anarchists. TRIAL OF J. O. GLENDENNING

Very Damaging Testimony Produced by the State Against Defendant,
