The Catalogue of Crimes.

MILWAUKEE, 15.—The prosecution in the Schell case was allowed to call two witnesses Saturday, and proceeded to prove by Officer Freelon, Central Station keeper, that Schell when arrested and being reached, said he wished he had a revolver so he could blow his brains out. He told the story of his life, and accounted for his whereabouts on the night of the fire. A severe cross-examination failed to elicit any contradiction in his testimony. The defense went on with their case, but did not complete it. It is thought Schell will be acquitted.

New York, 15.—Ex Mayor DeBorose, of Long Island city, is surrendered by his bondsmen and taken to the county jail. Judgment for \$100,000 is given against him for wrongful conversion of city bonds.

Philadelphia, 15.—Michael McAndrews, shot in his own saloon by Policeman Drotter, died today.

John Scott last night assaulted Policeman Barger who arrested him in the fighting he was probably fatally shot by Barger.

San Antonio, Texas, 15.—Two brothers named Bender were arrested at McKinney, Texas, yesterday, having in their possession a large quantity of counterfeit silver dollars and half dollars.

Atlanta, Ga., 15.—The jury in the United States Circuit Court find John Robinson guilty on 19 counts of an indictment charging him with the presentation of false accounts as Deputy Marshal. This is one of a series of prosecutions begun for the Department of Justice, which excited great interest, and the conviction marks a triumph.

Chicago, 15.—Late to-night in a fire in the city, during which a light, Fred Alkin slained and killed Ed. Sanford; both colored. The murderer escaped.

Crystal Springs, Miss., 15.—Dr. C. W. Smith was shot and killed by Hill by Jacob Rump of Troy, New York.

Andrew Lovelock was killed by E. Schevelin last evening. Both were drunk and related by marriage. Schevelin struck Lovelock with his fist, breaking his neck.

New York, 15.—The police made an attempt to-day to enforce the law, but were met by a mob, and the police were driven away.

Chicago, 15.—Daily News Meadville, Miss., special: Tom Bally, colored, outraged a young negro girl, and was shot and killed by her body in the pond. A mob took him from jail this morning and hanged him.

Central Falls, R. I., 15.—George H. Smith, financial secretary of the Superior Lodge of Odd Fellows, is arrested for embezzlement of lodge funds.

Boston, 15.—Journal: Edward C. Spofford, Quartermaster of Union Point, G. A. R., of Peabody, is reported to have been shot and killed by a mob in Danvers.

Norfolk, 15.—A negro, who at Windsor grossly assaulted a daughter of James Freeman, was captured there taken from jail by a mob and hanged.

New York, 15.—A dynamite cartridge was found to-day in the basement of Remond & Co.'s factory, Shimerhorn Street, Brooklyn. One hundred girls were at work in the upper part of the building. The cartridge was sufficient to demolish the factory.

Owego, N. Y., 15.—Gifford, on trial for wife murder, "inspired" two years ago to offer his little daughter as a sacrifice prepared for, and killed the child, is perfectly sane and will be arraigned for murder. He says the inspiration came from the devil.

Memphis, 15.—Fifteen penitentiary convicts escaped Sunday morning from Grant Bros. & Burrows' prison. Ten were recaptured; the others have gone down the river. They are part of the same gang that murdered J. H. Gantt near Helena, last February.

Galveston, Texas, 15.—News: Gateways special: One Chancey was shot to death by a mob in this county last week. One of the mob was killed, John O'Connor, shot by Jim O'Brien.

Kansas City, Mo., 15.—Edward E. Sage, who was consulting engineers, disappeared under suspicious circumstances. It is estimated there is a deficit of \$5,000 to \$25,000.

New York, 15.—Seven gambling houses were raided to-day, and property valued at \$15,000 taken. The gamblers and evidently been warned had remained away.

Chicago, 15.—Various journals are discussing the methods observed in burying the pauper dead, and the warden of the county hospital is made to say that one Charles, county undertaker, sells 75 per cent of the bodies to the medical colleges of this and other cities, and that his revenue from this source has exceeded \$5,000 annually. It is also charged by those who have visited the Potter's field that the bodies of dead babies have been interred by simply throwing a few shovels of earth upon them, and that evidences of this revolting usage are disclosed by the skulls and bones being found in various portions of the field with no earth covering them.

Boston, 15.—John F. McGovern, tanner at Woburn, said the skin of a negro unborn was brought to him by a boy by the name of Morrison. He wanted it tanned. Morrison said he brought it from Harvard, and that it came originally from Tewksbury. Morrison claimed to be a student. Pieces of the skin were shown, and Brown asked for a bit of it, which McGovern cut off and gave him.

San Francisco, 15.—It is a common report on the streets that a Senator Fair, of Nevada, aged about 25, attempted to shoot his father, but was prevented. The rumor attributes his act to domestic difficulties between his father and mother, coupled with too free use of liquor by young Fair. The matter is being kept very quiet, and it is difficult to obtain definite information.

Secretary Folger has appointed a committee consisting of Jas. C. New, Assistant Secretary, Mr. Robinson, Assistant Solicitor of the Treasury, and W. F. McCallan, Chief of the Warrant Division, to investigate the charges of official misconduct recently filed against Jas. G. Hill, supervising architect of the Treasury.

South and Missouri.
Montreal, 15.—Fluorid are re-

ported from various sections of the province; many bridges and dams are carried away, causing heavy loss.

Dubuque, Ia., 15.—This afternoon the bodies of Mrs. E. Zieppred, wife of a well known druggist of this place, and her three year old boy, were found at the bottom of a fifty-foot well. They were alone in the house during the forenoon. It is supposed the woman threw the child into the well, and jumped in herself, as the high curb around it forbade the supposition of falling in accidentally.

Albia, Iowa, 15.—The Atlantic House, of this city, burst in yesterday morning. Three guests were burned to death. The proprietor narrowly escaped with his life.

Portsmouth, Mass., 15.—Two children, a daughter of J. T. Howard and a son of Peter White, were burned to death in a large hotel while playing.

Washington, 15.—A severe storm is central of the North Carolina coast, apparently moving northward, and severe gales are reported on the coast.

Sioux City, Iowa, 15.—During the storm of Friday night, the house of a farmer named Damsel near Danbury in this county, was struck by lightning, instantly killing a three-year-old child, sleeping between the parents. The father will probably die; the mother is recovering.

San Francisco, 15.—The Saratoga Paper Mills, Santa Clara County, burnt last night; loss, \$75,000; insured.

New Orleans, 15.—The steamer Calvert, from Baltimore for this port, was sunk by collision at Port of Spain, Louisiana.

Ozark, Ark., 15.—A disastrous tornado struck White Station on the Little Rock and Fort Smith roads ten miles west of White Station, which with a force beyond power of description. Sides of the mountains previously covered with trees now show none standing. Rises are also reported in the neighborhood, and residences were leveled to the ground. The storm averaged three miles in width. No signs of fences any where in the neighborhood. A pile of railroad ties were found blown around as if they were straws. Reports of destruction of property and loss of life come from every direction.

St. Louis, 15.—The steamer Varon, one mile north, were fatally injured. Houses were swept away. W. E. McCain, D. Hall, J. Brasure, Wallace, Edgar Wade, Wm. Hann and others were killed. The Union church and schoolhouse, a mile northwest, is ruined. A storm of such severity was never before known here, and one small residence is all that remains. T. J. Lom's house and half a dozen others are in ruins. The storm reached Ozark, Faulkner county. No one killed or badly injured. The Catholic and Baptist churches are badly destroyed. Simmons Bros.' gin mill is totally destroyed. Hillard & Co's planing mill is swept away. The house of Praveinthal & Martin, brick makers, is unroofed, and the front of Brown's drug store blown in. Numerous residences are in ruins.

New York, 15.—The liabilities of C. H. Bond & Son are \$138,000; no assets \$97,000; actual, \$48,000.

Pittsburg, 15.—Marshall & Co., iron pipe company, and one of the largest firms in the city, made an assignment to-day to George S. Whitney for the benefit of creditors. Liabilities, \$1,500,000; assets, \$1,250,000. The cause was caused by extensive speculation in pipe iron.

The Ship Railway.
St. Louis, 15.—The Globe Democrat to-morrow will say: The proposed ship railway across the Isthmus of Tehuantepec has not been abandoned, as many suppose. Eads, its projector, has returned home, and from him it was learned that the work is being vigorously prosecuted and that the massive railway bridge will be finished long before De Lesseps' Panama canal is opened. Six weeks ago a strong syndicate was formed for the purpose of beginning the work and construction of the proposed line to see if the route selected could be improved on. Four parties of engineers are already in the field, and the general contractor, J. M. Bracklin, and a large force of laborers and mechanics are engaged in the construction. The neighborhood of Minatitlan, on Coahuila-coast River, has been selected as the northern terminus of the railway survey. The northern terminal sections have been filed with the government of Mexico, and approved by its officials. The Isthmus has appointed one of its most distinguished engineers to be associated with the work, in accordance with the terms of the concessions. He is now at Salina Cruz on the Pacific, and has been ordered to repair to Minatitlan. P. B. Certhell, who was Capt. Eads' chief engineer on the construction of the Mississippi River jetties, is chief engineer. Sir Edward Reed and John Fowler of London, and Capt. Reed and his assistants, are in the general charge of the work. Col. James L. Andrews, who built the Jetties, and Hon. A. C. Crockett, Capt. Eads' attorney, have been in London the past thirty days, and have just returned to the United States. The project is a grand one, and the advancement of the project. The work will be constructed to carry ships and cargoes of a gross weight of five thousand tons, which will accommodate ninety per cent. of the prospects of completing the read, Eads said he had not the slightest doubt of the work being finished, and that the line would be open for traffic before the end of 1887.

Professor Russell's Programme.
New York, 15.—Professor Russell, nihilist, and head of the leaders of the Irish dynamite party, who arrived from Europe yesterday, details some length the dynamite warfare to be waged against England. He claims one set of people have a right to the most effective weapons they can procure to demand their lives, liberties and property. He said that if England did not lose her hold on Ireland, his party would have her a mass of ruins, and that down upon her they would blow every English man-of-war and all mercantile ships flying the British flag and plying between British ports and on the seas. They could do this without breaking international law, and irrespective of where their ships were located, at a trifling expense. Every harbor in England could be fired; then they would blow up every bank in London, and take possession of the gold, say ninety-five million a year, that England had hoarded plundered from Ireland. Then they would begin the destruction

of the private property of the aristocracy, capitalists, and monopolists. They would then fill English rivers and harbors with torpedoes. Their harbors in Ireland would be protected with torpedoes, and English soldiers fought with explosives. They would not destroy the telegraph, but in particular places would destroy the railroads, so as to render impossible the transportation of troops. The professor dwelt on the easy method of obtaining and making explosives, even in the heart of London. In closing, he said they had England completely at their mercy, and had given her warning. If she did not take the warning, her doom would be on her own head.

Political Points.
Chicago, 15.—At the Iroquois club banquet, toasts responded to were "Thomas Jefferson" by Hon. James Broadhead of Missouri; "Democracy, past present and future," by Hon. Lyman Trumbull of Illinois; "The Constitution" by Col. W. J. P. Brockbridge of Kentucky; "Temperance a virtue, Prohibition a vice," responded to by J. G. Jenkins of Wisconsin; "Democratic progress" by W. H. Huriburt of the New York World; "The great northwest" by Hon. John C. Black of Illinois; "Monopolies should not rule" by Hon. S. J. Handell, Avram Hewitt, C. Cox of New York; Gen. G. B. McClellan and Gov. Ludlow of New Jersey; Governors Simeon of California; Crittenden of Missouri; McHenry of Louisiana; Adams of Nevada; Wallace of Connecticut; Barry of Arkansas; Blackburn of Kentucky, and Cleveland of New York. Ex-Senator McDonald of Indiana and numerous others sent letters of regret. Yesterday and to-day the rooms of the Iroquois club were filled with visitors, and the President's outlook was clouded at length. The general drift of opinion seemed to favor Samuel J. Tilden for the Democratic standard bearer in 1884. After Tilden, McDonald of Indiana was the favorite.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.
Galveston, 15.—No meteor has fallen at Williams' ranch. The report is false.

Mexico, 15.—The government denies the report circulated that United States capitalists cannot acquire land in this country.

Madison, Wis., 15.—Articles of association are filed for the Oregon Land and Mining Company of Milwaukee; capital, one million. They will operate in Oregon and Nevada.

Toronto, 15.—Eight more policemen leave to-night for Ottawa. The probable reason is to strengthen the force there upon the arrival of the Prince's Louise.

New York, 15.—The Tribune announces the death of Francis C. Bell, one of the proprietors of the New York Weekly. His estate is valued at a million and a half.

Chicago, 15.—Rev. Dr. Henry Bannister, Professor of Evangelical Theology in the Northwestern University of Evanston, died at Evanston, Ill., of lung and heart trouble, aged 71.

Chicago, Ill., 15.—In obedience to an order of the mayor, the telegraph companies of this city have been gathering their wires into cables carried on short poles, and so arranged that they can be thrown to the ground in case of fire. To-night the council passed an order directing the mayor to cause these cables to be removed at once.

Havana, 15.—The home government authorizes the importation of cut and the massive railway bridge into the provinces which suffered in the recent insurrection. The king has sanctioned a law extending for two years franchises for mining and metallurgical industries in the island, with importation duty free for five years of mining material and implements.

Jackonville, Fla., 15.—The President and party left Sanford last evening on a steamer. The President sat for an hour on deck in the moonlight, apart from his friends. The party proceeded by rail from Sanford to St. Augustine. Here a committee, Gen. Dent, ex-Frost Grant's brother-in-law at the head, escorted the company to the hotel and were received. The President goes fishing for channel bass. The Tallapoosa on entering the harbor grounded, but soon floated.

Chicago, 15.—It is announced that the Union Iron and Steel Company will resume work June 1st; that a settlement has been made with the creditors on a basis of 25 per cent. cash, the remainder in preferred stock.

New York, 15.—On account of the capture of Mergone by the insurgents, the vice-consul at Hayti has been notified that the government has closed the port to foreign commerce.

Carpenters generally have secured an advance of wages to \$5.50 per day. Painters are seeking a similar advance.

Fort Worth, Tex., 15.—A contract has been closed here for the shipment of 75,000 head of cattle from the grazing region south of this city on the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad to Wichita Falls, 114 miles north. It will require 5,000 cars or 215 trains of 14 cars each, at a total expense of \$105,000. The shipment is rendered necessary by a large amount of fencing recently put up in the southern part of the State.
