

MURDER IN THE SECOND DEGREE

Juzo Tsukuda Hears Verdict Read But Knows Not What It Means.

UNTIL IMPORT INTERPRETED.

Affecting Scene When Jury Announces Finding—Sentence Friday at 10 O'clock.

Verdict of murder in the second degree was the verdict of the jury which has heard the mass of testimony given in the trial of the case, against the diminutive Japanese heard Juzo Armstrong the whole of last week. When the foreman of the jury handed the verdict to the clerk of the court Saturday afternoon, Juzo Tsukuda, the prisoner, stood stolidly before the bar. He heard the verdict read which told his fate, but he knew not one word of what was being said. The scene was unusual in a court in this country, ordinarily a stranger brought to trial understands at least a little English. It was not so with Tsukuda. Not for several months after the verdict had been read and his fate decided upon did he know what the jury had determined. Whether he was to live or to die, he knew not.

The scene was particularly affecting, all in court realizing the plight in which the little Japanese lawyer has found himself. Throughout his trial he has maintained the same composure of his features, usually looking at the carpet beneath his feet and paying little attention to the court proceedings, which was understandable to him. When the jury entered the courtroom, took seats in the jury box and handed to the clerk of the court its verdict, the prisoner was visibly agitated. His features twitched and his hands moved nervously about. He waited in vain for the interpreter to repeat the findings in the Japanese tongue, but it was not for some time that this was done.

SENTENCE ON FRIDAY. Judge Armstrong fixed the time for sentence in his case for Friday morning at 10 o'clock. The findings of the jury, as given by the findings of the jury, is guilty of the murder of Turel Shinn at Garfield on July 4 of this year. The murder grew out of a quarrel over some earned money, which took place in the old Spanish house during the course of a drinking bout in which some 20 Japanese took part.

HAND WAS WORTH \$50,000. Katherine Porter, a pianist, has commenced an action in the Third district court against the Rio Grande system for \$50,000, claiming judgment in that amount for the loss of her hand in a railway accident at Durango, Colo., Dec. 24, 1905. "THE MANLIEST MAN."

Subject of Rev. McIntyre's Address Before Y. M. C. A. Men's Meeting.

"The Manliest Man" was chosen by the Rev. C. C. McIntyre as the subject of his address before the men's meeting at the Y. M. C. A. yesterday. The following are some pithy extracts from his address:

"In this age of practicality the thing which is valuable today is not what seems to be, but is. A man is not rated for what he dreams or thinks, but by what he does. And it is the same in religion. Business men are asking 'Who was Christ? How does He compare with other great men? What was He?'"

"Christ was the man of most composite character. Other great leaders have been faulty in being control of their passions, but He under the most trying circumstances never lost His composure of soul."

"Christ was the greatest of all men. No one ever asked Christ, 'What was He?' He followed Him. They were drawn by the strange fascination of the power of His personality."

"Christ was the greatest thinker of

the world. The history of philosophy is the record of what great minds have thought concerning God, the world and duty of man, but in one of His constant contemplations Christ stated the whole solution when He said: 'I am the way, the truth and the life.' 'Christ was the man of the greatest heart. On His crucifixion He died for the world.'

There are at least three characteristics of the man which impressed all comparison with other great men of the world. He was sinless. He was the only man who possessed that immaculate character of moral character which is the ideal of true manhood. 'All this proves that Christ was the manliest man of history.'

LECTURE ON "WOMAN'S WORK."

Wife of Elbert Hubbard Eliminates "Man" from Vocabulary.

Mrs. Elbert Hubbard, wife of the widely known Roycroft artist, spoke to a small audience at the First M. E. church Saturday upon the subject of "Woman's Work—An Inquiry and an Answer." She took occasion to apply the Christian Science cult, declaring it to be the only religion we have on earth. She declared all others to be of Asiatic origin. She assumed a prophetic attitude long enough to say that the world today will be looked upon by all people as a woman who has made it possible to reach heaven without paying the price of a passage that is mandated by the Roman Catholic church as the tender for salvation, or without subscribing to the doctrine of the Protestant church holding salvation to be free. Mrs. Hubbard straightened everything compelling woman to recognize man as the ruling force in the world's ways. She proclaimed the rights of man to be manly. However, she followed closely the lines of her husband, Fra Elberta, self-avowed in his lecture the previous night. She declared that the equality of her sex as regards that of her opposite. She wants the electoral franchise for her kind, failing to recognize the means by which it is obtained when it is obtained. "Man" seems to be without the vocabulary of the lecturer. In referring to the inferior sex, she invariably chose to designate him as "the male."

Curtis years ago made a fortune on the stage, but was forced to spend most of it to free himself from the charge of murdering a policeman in San Francisco. His trial was one of the most sensational criminal trials of the Pacific coast.

"DYNAMITE SQUAD."

That of New York Fire Department Makes a Great Run.

New York, Nov. 3.—After waiting twenty odd years for the "three fives" the "dynamite squad" of the fire department responded today to a test call and in regulation time was on hand with ammunition enough to have blown up the city.

The dynamite squad, or more properly, the "sappers" corps, was organized in the early '60s. The numbers are lieutenant or assistant lieutenant in 22 fire houses in Manhattan and the Bronx. A MEETING ON FIELD OF HONOR

Lieut.-Gov. Sanders of Louisiana Declines to Have One With Donelson McCaffery.

IT CREATES A SITUATION.

Discussion of Both Refused on to Avoid A Personal Encounter, but Friends May Be Drawn Into Quarrel.

New Orleans, Nov. 3.—The firm reply of Lieut.-Gov. J. W. Sanders, today to what has been universally accepted as a challenge for a duel by Donelson McCaffery, son of the late United States Senator Donelson Caffery, has created a dramatic political situation in Louisiana. Tonight another master entirely foreign to the personal combat has increased the tension. The practically rival proclamations of the lieutenant-governor and of Gov. N. O. Blanchard to the coming election, and the action of the legislature were brought face to face by the governor's arrival here today from the east.

Reply this morning, in direct controversy to the call of Sanders, McCaffery issued a written reply to the statement of Caffery. This statement declared that the lieutenant-governor himself personally responsible for the situation, which caused the trouble, and said:

"I am prepared to meet that responsibility, and Mr. Caffery knows where to find me."

Proceeding this statement, two representatives of each man in the senate had held conference, and Mr. Sanders had declared that he would not accept a challenge in accordance with the dueling code, because the lieutenant-governor could not violate the state law making dueling a crime.

Next followed the "boasting" of several sections of the state by Mr. Caffery with handbills stating that satisfaction had been refused him by Mr. Sanders.

These handbills declared that the lieutenant-governor had called some of Mr. Caffery's statements untrue. The director of both the lieutenant-governor and Mr. Caffery is relied on to prevent a personal encounter. There are fears, however, that friends of the disputants may be drawn into a serious quarrel.

Gov. Blanchard, before leaving for the east, announced that he would probably attend Mr. Sanders' proclamation, which placed corporation control before the extra session of the legislature.

A LEAP FOR LIFE.

Negro Pursued by Officers Jumps Into The Tennessee and is Drowned.

Knoxville, Tenn., Nov. 3.—In view of 300 people, Jim Davis, a negro, who had shot two negro women early Sunday morning, leaped from the rails of the Tennessee river bridge into the water, 100 feet below and was drowned before he could be rescued. Pursued by two deputy sheriffs Davis climbed to the top of the railing and pulled a pistol from his pocket, fired five times in the air, scattering the crowd which was trying to prevent him from suicide, and then, counting "One, two, three," leaped over the railing. In his last words before leaping Davis declared that he had killed 23 people.

RIDDLED WITH BULLETS.

Negro Who Was Implicated in Murder Of Police Officer.

Talladega, La., Nov. 3.—As a result of the murder of Tom Thompson, assistant chief of police, here last night, Fred Singleton, a negro, was riddled with bullets by a posse early today. In the shooting policeman Oswald, a member of the posse, was shot in the leg. Singleton's body was brought to Talladega this afternoon and there was the most intense excitement. The other negroes implicated in the killing of Thompson were caught and placed in jail at Talladega for safekeeping. Thompson's murder was peculiarly atrocious. He had arrested three cheap grocers who told him they knew where a big crap game was in progress and directed the officers to the chemical plant. When the officers arrived there, he was fired upon simultaneously from several directions. It is feared that the intense feeling aroused may result in further trouble.
