LOCAL BRIEFS.

Gift to Prison—D. A. Callahan has presented a copy of Roberts on Parliamentary Rules, to the Utah State Prison Society of Christian Endeavor.

Whitney Leaves Herald—City Circulation Manager Clark L. Whitney of the Herald has resigned after 17 years of service, and will become a stock broker.

Real Estate Sale—Mrs. Eanes McAndrew of Wardrop, Cal., is the purchaser of the 50 foot property north of Chadbourne hotel on State street. She proposes to improve it.

Sent to Hospital—Mrs. C. E. Lee of this city was examined as to her sanity yesterday afternoon before Judge Johnston and was committed to the state mental hospital at Provo.

Bennett Leaves City—George D. Bennett who for the past five years has been with Z. C. M. L. in the grocery department, has left that institution to enter the mercantile business as a his former home town, Kaysville.

Saltair Attendance—The attendance at Saltair yesterday, was reported at 19,069, with trains running every 45 minutes, and 10 cars on each train. Three extra engines were chartered with coaches from the San Pedro road.

Jensen Wants Pardon—Carl W. Jensen of Sanpete county, sentenced last May to one year in the state prison for forgery, petitions the board of pardons for a pardon. His application is endorsed by many citizens of Sanpete.

Annual Reunion—The officers, teachers and members of the Young Men's Mutual Improvement Association of Sugar House held their annual reunion from 4 to 8 p. m., today, at Liberty park. There will be a program and refreshments.

Buried Under Lumber—Two Greeks named John Salas and George Mills were buried under a lot of lumber which fell over them, Sunday afternoon, as they were unloading a car. Salas' right leg was broken and he was brought to St. Mark's hospital, but Mills escaped with a few bruises.

Pioneer Improving—James R. Smith, the pioneer flour miller of Utah, who has been quite ill at his residence on Seventh East between Eleventh and Twelfth South for several days, is reported much improved in health. His many friends hope for his complete recovery in the near future.

Warrant for Zeleico—The county attorney has issued a complaint against Nick Zeleico charging him with disturbing the peace. Nick, it is alleged, made threats against John Rogden at Bingham a few nights ago and was out looking for him with a gun. The complaint was filed in the Justice court at Bingham.

Bonds Signed Up—Chairman Wilson of the board of county commissioners and County Clerk J. U. Eldredge, Jr., having completed the signing of the \$250,000 refunding bond issue and the bonds have been turned over to County Treasurer Charles W. McAlister, to roll and issue to the purchasers of the bonds.

Greek Bound Over—Justice of the Peace Dana T. Smith yesterday bound over to the district court, in bonds of \$250, one George Pappas, a Greek, who was accused of inciting to riot at Garfield on June 14. Six weeks ago Pappas was released on habeas corpus proceedings, but was re-arrested last Saturday, and will answer to the district court.

Registrars Appointed—The county commissioners yesterday afternoon appointed the following registrars to fill vacancies: District No. 1, Helen M. Allen, vice Florence Cowan, resigned; district No. 63, Henry R. Watrous, vice J. P. Olsen, resigned. The board will hold a meeting tomorrow and fix the county and county school tax levy for the year.

However, he is very desirous of seeing the first street track removed, and the street turned into a city roadway, as it can be done if the residents will co-operate.

While engaging in a game, Kraak hung his coat on the wall. It was not until after leaving the place, however, that he discovered his loss, and he at once notified the officers, who are looking out for the thief.

There lives in Toole City at the present time, and have lived here for many years, Mrs. Joanna Ross McLaws, wife of John McLaws, and Mrs. Catherine Ross Gillespie, wife of John Gillespie, twin sisters, who were born in Heleburg, Dumbarthshire, Scotland, on the 23rd day of December, 1831, at least five and a half years before the Barton boys of Salt Lake, were born, an event that did not take place until July 21, 1836. SPECIAL SESSION GOES UP IN SMOKE

Governor Cutler Announces That He Will Not Call Such a Meeting Now.

MAKES LOGAN PEOPLE HAPPY.

Executive States That He Was Not Influenced by the Protest Made by Cache County.

A decision not to call a special session of the legislature to consider consolidation of the University of Utah and Agricultural college was arrived at yesterday afternoon by Gov. Cutler. The announcement followed a hearing of Representative Joseph Howell on the question of consolidation, and the presentation of a petition against an extra session. In making the announcement to the press representatives, Gov. Cutler stated that the receipt of the petition had not influenced his action, as he had made his mind up before the petition was received. He stated that a great diversity of opinion in the state on the question, and felt that the decision not to call an extra session would please most of the taxpayers.

President Kerr of the Agricultural college, who was at the Kenyon during the hearing before the governor, stated afterwards that the decision pleased him, as it would give the Agricultural college time to make its position clear to the people, an argument which was used forcibly a year and a half ago, to secure a postponement of action by the legislature.

The list of those signing the petition against an extra session includes men from almost every town, but contains a smaller percentage of men directly interested in educational problems than the petition for consolidation, while it contains a larger percentage of business men and members of the Manufacturers & Merchants' association.
