Committees—The Indian Bill.

WASHINGTON, 12.—Hager's appointment to the Senate-Pacific Railroad committee, vice Kelly, is a gain to the friends of an honest delegation of the Indians. Jones will go to the mining committee besides the post office.

The Indian appropriation bill contains an item of seven thousand dollars for the care of the Modocs. Among the new general provisions of the bill is one exacting labor from the able bodied Indians in return for supplies furnished.

Royalty has a Cold.

King Kalakaua was suffering so much from a severe cold when he reached his hotel, that a physician was called in.

Murder—Burned to Death—To be Amnestiated.

ST. PAUL, Minn., 12.—During a drunken quarrel between two roughs named O'Neill and Hall, at Blasmark, D. T. to-day, Hall shot O'Neill through the heart; the latter surrendered.

In Beaver Falls, Renville Co., a few nights ago, John Maughn's residence was burned, and his wife and child perished in the flames, the wife fearing to follow her husband through the flames and escape.

The special correspondent of the

Press at Ft. Garry, Manitoba, tele-

graphs that he knows positively that the imperial government intends to issue an amnesty to Bell and Lepine, in accordance with what is claimed to be Sir John A. Macdonald's promise. A number of persons, known that Bell passed through this city some two weeks ago, en route to Canada, although a premium was then and is now offered for his arrest, and the officers here are waiting to arrest him.

Indian Council.

MUSKOKA, I. T., 12.—At a coun-

cil of the peace commissioners and

Indians, to-day, resolutions were

presented by the delegates express-

ing gratitude on behalf of the In-

dian nations to the board of com-

mmissioners for their sympathy and

their expressed desire to have the

colonies of the Indians, thank the

President for his lenient and

kindly policy, asking congress to

respect the stipulations of their

treaties with them, and declining to

make a move toward changing

their national constitution, ex-

cept as provided in the treaties.

The Indians presented a number of

wishes, which they ask may be

remedied, among which are de-

lays in paying money due, grants

of their lands made to them, and

officers here are waiting to arrest

him.

More About Kalakaua.

WASHINGTON, 12.—King Kalaka-

ua was much loquacious, in conse-

quence of which no ar-

rangements have been made as to

his future movements. He is suf-

ferring with a very severe cold,

and an aggravated sore throat.

During the day Secretary Fish called at his hotel to see him, but did not do so, owing to his illness. His communi-

cate to the effect that the President re-

asked to come, he would do so if he

had time to do so.
