OUR dispatches for the past few days have brought tolerably ample details of the outbreak in Spain. For a considerable time past popular discontent in that country has been strong, and indications of a coming revolt have been numerous. The banishment, some few weeks since, by the Queen, of the Duke de Montpensier and other distinguished members of the Liberal party, increased the popular discontent, and it has at last burst forth into revolution.
