LOCAL BRIEFS.

Gordon academy (Hammond hall) opens for the fall term on Wednesday next. An attendance of 100 pupils is expected.

W. P. Noble has returned from Nevada, where he reports the best hay crop in 15 years, and that the livestock is in fine condition.

The stenographers' club will meet next Thursday evening in the Constitution block, after an adjournment of two months for vacation.

The funeral services of the late Mrs. M. T. Beattie will take place at the residence of Mr. R. S. Wells, 191 Second street, at 2 o'clock Thursday.

The principals of the public schools will be in their offices in the school buildings tomorrow, Thursday and Friday, 10 to 12 a. m. and 2 to 4 p. m., for convenience of parents of pupils.

Salt Lake clergymen, in common with other clergymen of the country, are being asked by the National Council of Women of Boston to preach peace sermons, on Sunday, Oct. 2; and clergymen have been received here to that effect.

County Treasurer W. O. Carbis and wife left Sunday for California on account of Mrs. Carbis' illness. It is said that she is in a serious condition, and it is hoped that the return will benefit her. Mr. Carbis will return as soon as his wife shows signs of improving.

Dave Crowther and Joe Mellen reported to the police yesterday that six sets of house rings, valued at \$6 per set, had been stolen from them. A description of the stolen stuff has been given to the officers, and they are now looking for the rings and also for the thieves.

Sheriff Emery has turned over to Deputy United States Marshal Page for deportation, Yee Quin Yee, a Chinaman, who has been ordered deported by the government officials. Yee was arrested in this city on Aug. 9, and has been in jail awaiting the action of the officials ever since.

Bonjamin Fay, a California stopping at 255 south East Temple street, died suddenly last night, of hemorrhage of the lungs. He had arrived here only last Saturday, accompanied by his two boys, aged 12 and 15 years, who will be returned to the coast. Their mother is dead.

Undertaker Ed. O'Donnell has returned from Idaho and Wyoming, where he undertook to undertake all the fish in the streams of those two states. He did manage to harvest a goodly lot into his funeral car of a soap net, and has brought back most of them carefully embalmed for consumption by his friends and patrons.

In celebration of the event Baby Cathleen, or the "Angel of Peace," as she has been lovingly called, will make her debut as hostess next week, when, at Sandy Point farm, the lovely Portmouth home of her parents, says the New York American, she will give a children's party to all the young Vanderbilts.

There will be present the children of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Vanderbilt, of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney (the latter Gertrude Vanderbilt), and of Mr. and Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt. The only child members of the family missing will be the children of Cornelius, Duchess of Marlborough. It will be the first time in all their young lives that the little cousins will have met and enjoyed a playtime and they are all looking forward to it with the keenest enjoyment.

While Cathleen Vanderbilt is too young to enter into the sport actively, she will be a happy lookout for the one of the best-natured babies that ever cooed and gurgled with joy. That she is a Vanderbilt no one could deny, for she has already singularly marked Vanderbilt features. At the same time, her expression, particularly about the eyes, she reminds one of her pretty mother. If she retains the same vivacity and bubbling over of good nature, which makes her so winsome and lovable as a baby, she will make the eyes of a spirited and witty grandmother like Nelson.

For the party little Cathleen's mother has provided a program which will delight all the children. Sandy Point farm is an spacious and so thoroughly country in its surroundings that it offers splendid opportunities for an outdoor fête and will be a distinct change from the Bellevue avenue home of the Cornelius Vanderbilts.

The reconciliation of the Vanderbilts is an event which has caused the greatest satisfaction not only to the immediate friends and that circle of individuals known as society, but to nearly a decade of years and began when young "Neely" Vanderbilt, the eldest son of the late Cornelius Vanderbilt and future head of the family, lost his heart to pretty Grace Wilson, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard T. PUBLIC SCHOOLS

THEY WILL SOON OPEN

First Meeting of the Present School Year Held in This City This Morning.

A GREETING TO PRINCIPALS.

Superintendent Christensen Reports The Outlook Auspicious—Other Meetings.

The principals of the city schools held their first meeting of the present school year this morning at 10 o'clock, Supt. D. H. Christensen presiding. Mr. Christensen extended a cordial greeting to the principals and noted the presence of the entire number of last year, with the addition of Miss Shields, who will assume the duties of principal of the Jordan school. All preparations for the coming year are well defined, and the outlook is therefore satisfactorily auspicious. Requisition books are printed for their use by principals.

Mr. East visited the different buildings this afternoon to deliver courses of study, which will serve as a basis of distribution of books among pupils. Since some few changes have been effected in the curriculum, special meetings have been called later in the week for principals. After the general assembly of the principals next Saturday morning at the Lafayette, principals and teachers will meet in the respective schools to discuss matters vital to the success of their districts.

At the special meeting this afternoon, the committees of the board of education are to decide on the boundaries of school districts and pass upon the reports of teachers for the ensuing year. The East Side High school, which has been increased to include two years' work, is meeting with general satisfaction from east sides. The complaints from that quarter are now reduced to a minimum. An excellent corps of teachers will operate there and undivided support from patrons of the public schools is justly expected. The West Side High school, of course, continue to give the excellent four years' courses in its English, scientific, normal and business departments. All of well have secured for that part of the public school system an enviable reputation among similar institutions of the Union.

ANOTHER FAKE.

"Wagon Dope" the Latest Drug on the Salt Lake Market.

"Fake wagon dope" is the latest graft to engage the attention of the Salt Lake police.

These are the two railroad trains with the world's record for the highest speed. In the instant when they meet a simultaneous note of greeting and farewell renounces the air of Crane's Village from the throats of both whistles.
